Netarts Road Ready For Travel.

This Road is a Valuable Asset to Tillamook City, And a Delight to The Tourists.

Since the new county road to Netarts has been completed hundreds of people have traveled it by team and automobile and pronounce it to be one of the finest highways both as to construction and scenic beauty there is anywhere through the hills in the western part of Oregon. The right of way chosen could not be any better as the grades are very little, nine and a half being the greatest and that is one small hill, other grades are more moderate, and it runs through some very fine large green timber, always the delight of the tourist. The length of the road is seven and a half miles from Tillamook to Happy Camp. The summit is about half way and the first view of the ocean is about forty rods beyond the summit. From here on a near to the ocean drive would have been preferable from a scenic standpoint but it was found unpracticable on account of the character of the country and nature of the soils on the hills along the beach. The contracts for the construction of the road were held by Wells and Leach, and Mead and Payne. About four miles of road was constructed by them of which two miles through the big timber is planked. The total cost of construction was \$11,000 of which Wells and Leach receive \$5,800.00, and Mead and Payne, \$5,200.00. They certainly did a good job as there is a good wide road bed and lots of cuts and fills were necessary to minimize the grade. The continued rains during the season has made the grading an expensive job.

This road to the beach from Tillamook is a splendid thing for Tillamook, as Netarts beach is the finest along the Pacific coast and is the one that every person desires to come to when visiting Tillamook. The road practically makes Netarts a part of Tillamook as it is only a few minutes run to the beach and with our improved Hotel facilities many tourists can make their home in Tillamook while enjoying this as well as other delightful hot weather retreats. Beside the tourist business this road opens up a large section of fine ranch country along the beach which heretofore has been almost inaccessible to Tillamook. It is predicted that in the very near future electric cars will be running along this highway. Last Sunday several hundred people went to Happy Camp at Netarts in every conceivable conveyance possible to get. It is reported that camping space there will soon be at a premium and people wishing to avail themselves of the delights at Netarts should make reservations early. Automobiles make the trip from here to Netarts easily in twenty minutes.

Engineer Jackson is to be commended on the fine easy grade of the route chosen. The county court on the character and permanency of the road and the contractors for their faithful conscientious work performed in putting the road into the conditions that it is. The Netarts road, although appearing expensive in the start is a good investment for everyone concerned.

THE HADLEY CASE NOW UP FOR TRIAL.

Judge Campbell of Oregon City accompanied by his stenographer Mr. Runyon arrived in the city Monday evening and this morning the judge took up the Hadley case. The attorneys for the defendant Clark Hadley are S. S. Johnson of this city and Ralph R. Dunnway of Portland. The attorneys for the plaintiff are Oak Nolan of Portland and H. T. Botts of Tillamook.

The case is one wherein the plaintiff Otelia Hadley, wife of the late C. B. Hadley, is presumably suing for a share of the Hadley estate, which is in the hands of Clark Hadley. Since the case was instituted Clark Hadley made a settlement with Otelia Hadley for \$7,000, said settlement being made without the consent of plaintiff's attorney Oak Nolan, whereupon Mr. Nolan endeavors to continue the case securing deposition from Mrs. Hadley, which states among other things that undue influence was brought to bear upon her in causing her to make a settlement.

A motion has been made by the defendants to suppress the deposition in question, and this particular phase of the case is now before Judge Campbell for consideration.

FAIR DIRECTORS MEET.

The Board of Directors of the Tillamook County Fair Association met at the Tillamook Commercial Club rooms last Saturday afternoon and transacted business in connection with the fair which will be held here Sept. 3rd 4th and 5th.

A. A. Lommen who was elected as director from the north end of the county would not accept the position and H. F. Effenberger of Wheeler, has been appointed to take his place. Mr. Effenberger, Mr. S. W. Elliott, Mr. Will Spaulding, Mr. L. M. Kraner and Mr. K. Y. Blaylock were in attendance at the meeting. Mr. Dunstan, president of the board was unable to attend on account of illness.

More Building For Tillamook.

Some Fine Residences About to be Erected. Outside Capital Has Confidence in Our City.

Building activity is on the increase in Tillamook and many fine residences are being erected. M. R. Hanenkratt is about to erect a modern bungalow on his property on the corner of Fourth Street and First Ave. West, near the school house. This building was designed by J. F. Stranahan, architect, and equipped throughout with every modern improvement. It will be occupied by Oscar Schultz.

A new five room home has recently been completed by W. O. Kilburn in Stillwell Park Addition. It will be occupied by Mr. Watkins, the new express man.

Rollie W. Watson is now finishing a six room house in King's Addition, the same to be occupied by Attorney Gerston.

Fred Minich has the contract for building the terminal warehouse for Daniel J. Frye of Salem, the same to be completed by the 15th of August. This building will be 105x53 feet, and will be placed on concrete foundations. It will have a capacity for fifty cars of freight.

Money for some of the above improvements is being furnished by the Equitable Savings and Loan Association of Portland, which firm has placed \$18,000 in Tillamook investments during the past week.

Ira Smith is planning on building a new home on the corner of Second Avenue East and Eighth Street. This residence will be 34x41 feet, with basement 22x34 feet. It will have six rooms and afford every modern convenience. It will cost \$2500.

Bales and Erskine are now engaged in building a residence for Miss De Par on Fifth Ave., above Sixth Street.
