**FISHERMAN ARRESTED.**

Chris. Hansen and H. M. Todd were arrested by Game Warden Leach the first of the week for violating the salmon fishing law and were taken before Justice Stanley on Wednesday.

Hansen was taken up on two charges, one was for stretching his net more than 4 across the stream and the other charge was for operating a set net without complying with the law in regard to monuments and license numbers. Todd was taken up on the same charges.

Hansen was fined \$200 and costs on the first charge and \$20 and costs on the second. Todd was fined \$50 and costs on the first charge and \$10 and costs on the second. This being Todd's first offense, he was given the minimum fine. Hansen was given heavy fines because of the fact that he has been before the court many times and seems to be a chronic violator of the fish law.
