We have been enjoying very settled weather during the past three months, and everything has been going on very nicely with us. The resorts have been well patronized and the business of the county has been transacted without any serious handicap. It will soon be time for the rains, and then later on the big storms will follow which may or may not be profitable to some extent. It is thought, however, that traffic will not be tied up as it was last year by the slides on the railroad. During the past summer the Steamer Elmore, the only boat which now enters this port, has been well patronized, especially by the farmers, who have made all their cheese shipments by that boat. The merchants, however, have shipped most of their goods by rail, and if they continue to do so the Elmore may be compelled to lay off for the season as soon as the heavy cheese shipments are over, for this reason our merchants ought to give this matter some consideration. The Steamer Elmore is at present making this place a competitive shipping point, and has during the past year saved the farmers nearly \$10,000 in freights on cheese and feed.

The editors have made a trip over the county and they have found much good road work done and being done by the present administration of county affairs. It may be that some localities are unduly neglected in regard to the matter of roads, and it may be that the court ought to make more improvements at some points and less at others. However that may be, we believe the court ought to receive credit for the good work it has done. In considering the needs of the whole county and the improvement of nearly 500 miles of roads that have been laid out in this county, the court is quite apt to look at propositions from a different view point than the individual does.

There was one thing in particular which we noticed in looking over the roads and that was the improved appearance of the work that has been done this summer, which goes to prove that with time and experience our people are learning more about road building, and in consequence the people are getting more for their money. At the present rate of road building, it is reasonable to anticipate that by another three years we will have a fine winter road from the southern line of the county to the northern line. Good roads are one of the most valuable assets a county can have and will no doubt make Tillamook County headquarters for auto tourists the year around, in the very near future. It is rather difficult to tell just how much wealth is brought into the county now by the tourists, but it must be considerable for there have been many of them this summer and they are as a rule good spenders.

Within the period of three seasons the dairy industry of Oregon has increased its production from \$10,158,000 to \$20,440,000. Every year is adding to the importance of dairying in the state, and each season recently has shown quite a material increase in the holdings of cows. During the last season the increase amounted to about 14,000 head. For years the Pacific northwest has

been compelled to purchase the bulk of its requirements of butter from the northwest and east, but a few more seasons of progress such as has been made recently, will take this section out of the importing class and make it an exporter of dairy products. The make of butter and value for each of the last three years is estimated:

Production, 1913, 20,000,000 lbs.	1912, 18,000,000; 1911, 11,000,000.
Value, 1913, \$7,000,000; 1912, \$5,040,000; 1911, \$3,400,000.	

Along with the increase in the production of butter is announced a liberal increase in the make of cheese. Both the Tillamook and Coos Bay sections showed rapid strides of dairy development during the last few years, and this has had a direct effect upon the manufacture of cheese. The output and the value follows with 1913 estimated:

Production, 1913, 9,000,000 lbs.	1912, 8,000,000; 1911, 5,000,000.
Value, 1913, \$1,440,000; 1912, \$1,050,000; 1911, \$758,000.	

The prices obtained for milk and cream by Oregon dairymen are the highest in the entire country. This season's values to date are far the highest ever known since the local industry was given a start. Better sanitary conditions are shown and the producer is today receiving far better results from his offerings and work in proportion to what the consumer pays than ever before. The estimated output of milk and cream in the state for this year as compared with the previous two years shows:

Milk-cream, 1913, 26,000,000 gallons;	1912, 24,000,000; 1911, 17,000,000.
Milk-cream, value, 1913, \$12,000,000;	1912, \$10,000,000; 1911, \$5,000,000.

TILLAMOOK COUNTY WILL BE REPRESENTED AT STATE FAIR.

On Thursday morning J. H. Dunstan and wife and daughter Crystal and Ira Smith and wife left for Salem for the purpose of looking after the Tillamook County state fair exhibit. The car containing all of the exhibit except 50 cases of Red Clover Cheese which was sent by boat, left Tillamook on Wednesday.

The cheese exhibit which will consist of 101 cases of cheese from the cooperative factories and 50 cases from the Red Clover factory, will be kept separate from our other exhibits. Fred Christensen and S. W. Elliott who will look after the cheese exhibit, left for Salem this morning. Mr. Schmelzer went out to look after the Red Clover exhibit.

Tillamook County's exhibit is composed of many kinds of vegetables and fruits. The fishing industry is also well represented. Salmon, crabs, clams and mussels were sent in the ordinary glass cans as well as a fine lot of honey which was tendered by John Theiler. Mrs. D. Billings sent nine varieties of canned fruit and six varieties of canned vegetables.

C. E. Donaldson sent a fine exhibition of vegetables, grasses, etc., making a total weight of nearly a ton. Mr. Donaldson is surely a booster when it comes to making a showing for Tillamook County.

Besides the 101 cases of cheese the car which was furnished by the railway company carried 34 boxes and 12 sacks of vegetables, 9 large kale plants, 3 large boxes of glass canned fruit, 2 cases of canned salmon donated by Mr. Ridehalgh, and some other products.

The people have responded well and considering the fact that those in charge had only ten days in which to gather the exhibit, we must say that everyone taking part have done fine.
