Hiram H. Johnson was born in New York State, Aug. 17, 1832 and died Sept. 20, 1913. Aged 81 years, one month and 3 days. He was married to Mary E. Turney, Oct. 21, 1850. To this union twelve children were born, nine of whom are living; one son and three daughters in North Dakota and one son and three daughters in Yakima County, Wash., and one son in Tillamook, Ore.

He lived in Adams County, Iowa, for thirty years, and nine years in North Dakota. Since May 1910, he has lived in Yakima County, Washington.

He joined the Dunkard church in 1836, at Mt. Etna Iowa, and has lived in that faith ever since. He leaves a wife to mourn his death.

**National Capital Brevities.**

Navies of the world will be invited to hold a great demonstration at Hampton Roads to celebrate the opening of the Panama canal.

Customs changes in the new nickel have led many people to believe that the coins are counterfeit. The United States treasury department gives assurance that the new nickel is genuine.

The currency bill has passed the house by a vote of 286 to 84. The measure goes to the senate with President Wilson's endorsement. All amendments offered by the minority are rejected.

A campaign to raise the Progressive party strength in the house has been started. Nineteen progressives of the house and Senator Miles Pol Dexter were named on the committee, with Representative Hinchbaugh as chairman.

Exhibits intended for the Panama-Pacific exposition of 1915 may now enter the United States duty free. President Wilson signed the bill enacting into law this exemption to the existing tariff law.

The war department has been asked by financial interests of Wall street to increase the number of soldiers on Governor's island. It is feared that release may result from mobs and "hell-raiders." The island is near the base of Catalina.
