**GERMAN IN PUBLIC SCHOOL**

University of Oregon, Eugene, Oct. 8.—Is the public school pupil too young to take a foreign language? In Europe he is not; in America, he is so considered, because the first grade studies in language other than English are given in the high school.

In Eugene, however, under the auspices of the University of Oregon the educational experiment is to be tried of giving German to seventh and eighth grade boys and girls. The idea is to be extended to other Oregon cities if successful in Eugene.

The language is to be taught as an "extra" and pupils will not be required to take it. Instructor will come outside the pupils' regular school hours. The teaching will be largely in German so the pupil can acquire the language as nearly as possible by the natural method. University of Oregon professors will do the teaching. Prof. Ayer, head of the department of education, and Dr. Friedrich Georg G. Schmidt, professor of the German language and literature, believe German should be undertaken before the high school is reached.

Teachers over Oregon generally are expected to watch the experiment with keen interest.

**GOOD ROADS CHEAPER!**

From Journal: In the agitation for good roads it should ever be borne in mind that it is a waste of money to build anything that will not be enduring and permanent. The old macadam road is not accounted the best. Practically every government report issued the past five years on the subject of road building has told of the failure of the ordinary macadam road. In the state of New York it is estimated that the maintenance expense of macadam roads has run as high as \$1000 per mile per year.

Probably the best example of concrete roads is found in Wayne county, Michigan, in which Detroit is located. The average cost of these concrete roads in this county is between \$12,000 and \$16,000 per mile. All the material has to be shipped from abroad.

Wayne county has over 100 miles of concrete road and the annual upkeep expense is less than five dollars per mile.

This is a practical demonstration of the great economical value of hard surface roads. The first cost may seem high but the saving in upkeep makes for cheapness in the end.
