



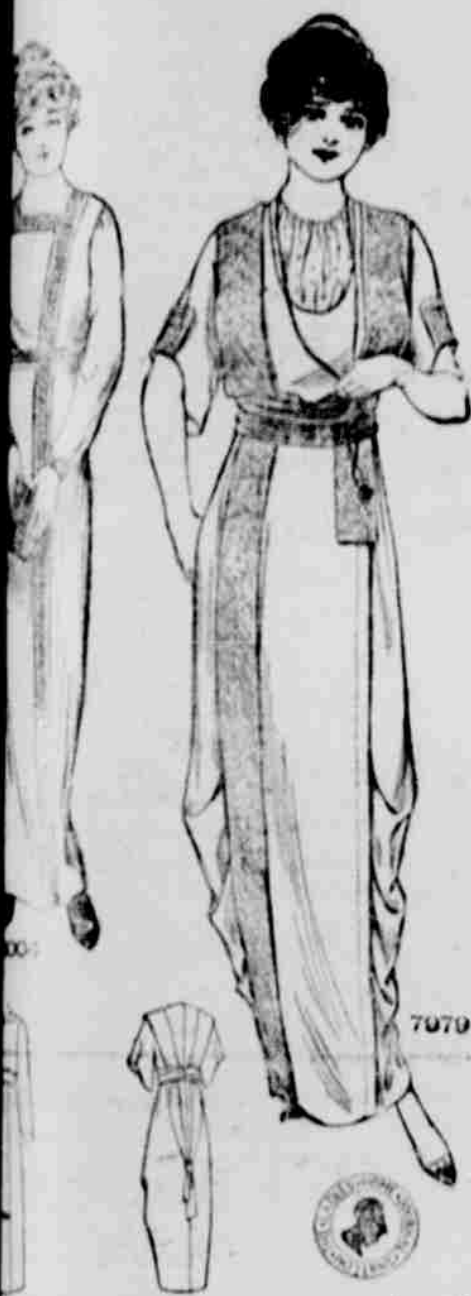

Knights of Pythias Meet in Portland.

Rites Administered on Historic Bible; First Time Book is Brought to Coast

The grand lodge of the Knights of Pythias of Oregon will hold its thirty-second annual session in Portland beginning today. It is said this will be the most important session ever held by the grand lodge in this state.

The grand lodge session will be held in the hall of Ivanhoe lodge, No. 1, of Portland, at Eleventh and Alder streets. Probably the chief event of the convention and one which has attracted hundreds of Knights from all parts of the state in addition to those who are delegates to the grand lodge occurred Monday evening, Oct. 13, in Swiss hall, 233 1/2 Third street.

This was an initiation in the first rank of the order at which the obligation will be administered on the Bible which Justus H. Rathbone, founder of the order, used in obligating its first members almost 50 years ago. This is the first time this Bible has ever been brought west of the state of Kansas, and the Oregon Knights, feeling that they are especially honored by having it at this convention, will have a large class of candidates on this occasion.

These candidates will come from lodges all over Oregon. Large numbers of Knights will also come to Portland especially to see this historic relic that is dear to the hearts of 800,000 members of this fraternity.

This Bible is now in the custody of Fred E. Wheaton, supreme keeper of records and seal of the supreme lodge of the order. It was brought to Portland by Mr. Wheaton, whose presence at this session is a feature which will attract a great deal of attention in itself. Mr. Wheaton personally administered the obligation in this rank and this initiation ranked as the most noteworthy event in the history of Pythianism in Oregon.

Another feature of the Monday evening session was the presentation of veterans' jewels to 39 members of Ivanhoe lodge of Portland. These jewels typify at least 25 years' continuous membership in order, and the emblems which will be presented are all of solid gold. The presentation speech will be made by Mr. Wheaton.

The grand lodge opened Tuesday morning and will be in session Tuesday and Wednesday and possibly longer. The most important matter to come up is consideration of plans to secure the supreme lodge meets biennially and at the 1914 session the supreme lodge will be invited to come to Portland in 1916. Schoonover, grand chancellor of California, and Fred Tonkin, grand chancellor of Washington, will also be present at the grand lodge.

While the grand lodge of the Knights is meeting, the grand temple of the Pythian Sisters will also be in session in Portland, and on Tuesday evening the annual grand ceremonial session of Dramatic Order of the Knights of Khorassan will take place. This order, which is the fun-making branch of Pythianism, expects to hold the most notable session in its history and members from all parts of Oregon will be initiated that night to the Portland temple, which is the only one of the order in this state.

The attendance at this session of the grand lodge will be by far the largest in any session ever held in this state. There are 80 lodges in Oregon now and each will be entitled to from two to five delegates each so there will be almost 300 regular delegates at the grand lodge session.

He said that only about one person in five thousand manifested such acute hearing. The musical was highly pleasing to the audience."

HEAVY PENALTY FOR ILLEGAL VOTING.

The last legislature changed many laws and made many new ones. One of these is in regard to illegal registration voting. The penalty is severe. Section 3465 of the general laws of Oregon provide that "any person who shall willfully or fraudulently register more than once, or register under any but his true name or attempt to vote by impersonating another who is registered, or knowingly register in any precinct where he is not a resident at the time of registering, upon conviction shall be punished by imprisonment in the penitentiary not less than one year nor more than three years, or by fine of not less than \$100 nor more than \$2,000, or both such fine and imprisonment" may be imposed.
