There is not a town in the state that has a brighter future than Tillamook. It is now up to us to take advantage of our opportunities.

The steamship companies which are preparing to ply between European ports and Pacific Coast ports are encouraging, through a system of selling steamship tickets on the installment plan, a very large immigration to this country as soon as the Panama Canal is ready for use. This means that we will soon he face to face with some very serious problems, as many of the foreigners who will come to our shores will be without necessary means. We are now able to take care of a fair amount of this class of immigration, but it is a serious question as to what we will be able to do with a great influx of this kind of people.

The people coming from Europe will be looking for cheap lands. They will be looking for an opportunity to become owners of homes and tillers of the soil. The thing that we should now be thinking about is, what have we got to offer them?
