COMMUNICATION
 To the Editor of the Herald:
 As a farmer of this county I desire to express my disapproval of Mr. Baker's harangue in the headlight in regard to inflated farm values in Tillamook County. Farm values are far from high water-mark in this county and they are sure to advance another 25 per cent in the next five years. I make this prediction because farm property has not, as alleged by Mr. Baker, attained its present price as a result of clever manipulation on the part of any real estate speculator but wholly as a result of the energy and intelligence of the Tillamook farmer who has established its value from the standpoint of production. This energy and intelligence is day by day bringing about better methods as to manufacturing, handling and marketing our products, in crop raising, in housing, feeding and breeding cattle, etc. These improved methods will have a marked effect upon farm values and it is therefore conservative to say that another advance of 25 per cent can be expected. Dairy lands along this coast, in Coos Co. Oregon and Humboldt Co. Cal., with no better soil and not as favorable climatic conditions, are held fully as high as here. In portions of Europe, where dairying has reached a high state of perfection, low lands of much the same character as low lands in Tillamook Co. are valued at two thousand dollars per acre.
 If Mr. Baker would devote one half of the time and energy he has put in for the last six months in his senseless attack upon certain individuals, whom we believe, have rightfully opposed the Warren Construction Company, to a study of industries that will build up our country and substitute educational matter along dairy and other lines of vital importance to all of us for the obnoxious "snap shots" the people who read his paper would be more edified and less bored.
 Brother farmers, be not discouraged, the same intelligent effort that made Tillamook cheese famous and has built up the value of our lands will continue our prosperity. Let us hope that time will bring to us a guiding hand at the helm of the Headlight whose ideals will be higher than an abuse of citizens in private life, who will not give way to petty malice and attempt to knock our county, its farmers and successful business men.

CAR OF SALMON GOES EAST
 On Thursday morning the Tillamook Co-operative Fish Co., shipped by Wells Fargo Express a car load of salmon. The weight of the salmon was 25,000 pounds. The shipment was made to New York City, where it will be taken by eastern fish men and distributed throughout the east.
 The Co-operative Fish Co. expects to ship two carloads of fish each week. The fish are well iced before leaving here and are iced again at Portland and one other point before reaching New York City. The trip from Portland to New York will be made in four days. During that time every care will be taken by the express company to see that the fish arrive in New York in good condition.
 F. D. Fisher of Portland, route agent for the Wells Fargo Co., was here assisting E. T. Watkins, local agent, in getting the new undertaking under way.
 Five years ago the Wells Fargo Co. began the routing of refrigerator cars from coast to coast. At that time the company owned 10 cars, now it is operating 250.
