A THIRTY-FIVE HOUR OCCASION.

The Good Book tells us of people whom God gave the desire of their hearts, but brought leanness to their souls. From childhood I had a desire to cross a bar and ride on the ocean; that desire has more than been gratified and it brought leanness to my body of about twelve pounds. So I can truly recommend it as being quite a flesh reducer, but Oh! the excruciating pain by which the process is wrought.

On Oct. the 14th the Steamer Breakwater left Portland with every berth and available spot crowded. I was placed in a small lower east room at the extreme rear. There were six little beds, three in a tier mine happened to be a middle one near the wee window, if it had not been I doubt if I would now be writing of the trip. Six women and three small children were to occupy those beds; none of my companions had ever been on the briny deep before. If we had we surely would have tried to secure an upper room near the center of the boat; all were in a merry mood saying that they wanted to see every object of interest and make it the trip of their life (which they did). I promised to point out the capes as we passed them (but it was a broken vow.) That night those sweet little children lip their evening prayer and I repeated the poem that was in one of my old school readers:

"We were crowded in the cabin,
 Not a soul would dare to sleep;
 It was midnight on the waters
 And a storm was on the deep.
 "We are lost!" the captain shouted
 As he staggered down the stair,
 When a little maiden said,
 "Isn't God upon the ocean
 Just the same as on the land?"
 And we kissed the little maiden
 And spoke in better cheer;
 And we anchored in the harbor
 When the sun was shining clear."
 My room mates were too exuberant to sleep much or let any one in the room sleep. A short time after day light the word came we were at Astoria, all dressed and went out, the prominent talk was: "Don't think about getting sick." There was a charmed fascination beyond description in riding those huge waves and I grew particularly poetical and Tennyson's poem revolved through my mind:
 "Sunset and evening star,
 One clear call for me."
 I reflected on the bar that each must cross and how glad I was that I had chosen the Great Captain to be my Pilot. The boat gave a sudden lunge when I found something leaving my stomach and was going over the railing, a short pause and the same process continued for four times and I decided I had better get to bed. With great effort I managed to get inside of the door fell faint on the floor falling face foremost. Just to think of how I had studied physical culture and the time spent in practice of how to fall gracefully and then to go sprawling; probably half an hour later I was aroused by one of the sick women (for they had all gone to bed) saying "poor thing," but they were all too sick to help, soon the porter came, helped me to bed with all my wraps on even my rubbers. I lay there on my back for about thirteen hours only when I raised my head up to put my mouth over one of those detestable little buckets fastened near my nose. My pain was certainly in the superlative degree and I wondered how many hours that mortal flesh could endure such pain as I suffered when crossing the Coos Bay bar. I did not feel a bit like the dying sailor who said "Oh! bury me not in the deep deep sea," for I cared but little what became of the "old tenement house of clay" when I began to spit blood. The Navigation Co. was not impoverished much by me or any one in my room for I never tasted a bit of food or a drop of water while on the boat. The porter insisted I eat a few crackers but I just could not and so hid them under my pillow. My room mates represented Michigan, Wisconsin, Nebraska, Idaho and Ohio. So often have I emphasized the verse where James says, "Count it all joy when ye fall into diverse temptation" so I did count it joy for I could not feel it joy. The captain told me at Marshfield that the voyage was unusually rough. I am well pleased with my pastorate here at Coquille. Am now at Gravelford, helping Brother and Sister Waymire in a revival service.

COURT IN SESSION FRIDAY.

Circuit Court will convene in adjourned session on Friday the 31st, to consider the case of Smith vs. Hughey which case was carried to the Supreme Court and returned to the Circuit Court, because of an error made by the judge in his instructions to the jury.
