CANNING OPERATIONS GOING FULL BLAST AT BAY CITY

Canning operations are now at full swing at the cannery. While there has not been a great run of Silversides so far during the season, the run of Chums has been something exceptional for this early. A large force of Chinamen is employed in the washing and cleaning departments as usual. The Oregon Fisheries Company probably has more workers in these departments than any other cannery, considering the amount of output.

Manager Ridebaugh is a hair splitter on the question of cleanliness. It is his boast that his fish are better cleaned than in any other cannery on the coast and he maintains this standard although it means the employment of a larger crew of men and a delay in the work. While it takes longer for a fish to go from the butner table to the machines he feels that the reputation of the cannery is of more importance than the extra cost. Thus far in the season there has been an exceptional run of Chums and an indication that this variety of salmon will be the most plentiful this year. The Chinook season was unsatisfactory as regards the number of fish, but the average size and weight of each fish has been far above that of any previous year.

From the present indications the Silverside season will be short and very few fish in comparison with other seasons, will be taken. The season has been an exceptionally bad one for the fishermen and the employees in the mild cure department have not been overworked. High boats have been turning in 200 or more Chums daily, and the fish dock at the cannery has looked like a busy place.

Declaring that the rock proposition adjacent to Bay City was sufficiently good to warrant his placing a bid on the jetty work, J. W. Sweeney of the Sweeney Construction Company of Portland left Bay City Tuesday for his home, after an investigation of the situation of several days duration in this city. Mr. Sweeney is at the head of one of the largest construction companies of Portland, and his experience teaches him the value of knowing conditions. Not only was he favorably impressed with the situation as it stands, but expressed himself as being willing to back his judgment with a bid on the work.

M. J. Miller, the local confectionery man, has completed all arrangements for the taking over of the Bay City telephone exchange, and a crew of men are now engaged in making the transfer from the drug store to his place of business. It is expected that the installation will be complete by the first of the month. Line-foreman Brawley and a crew of men have recently finished a trip along the beach and Bay City lines of the telephone company, and by the system of transposing, or crossing of the wires at stated intervals have greatly improved the service by eliminating all effects of induction and reducing the bother some humming of the wires to a minimum. It is the intention of the company to improve their beach service for the coming season, and numerous new lines are now being strung.

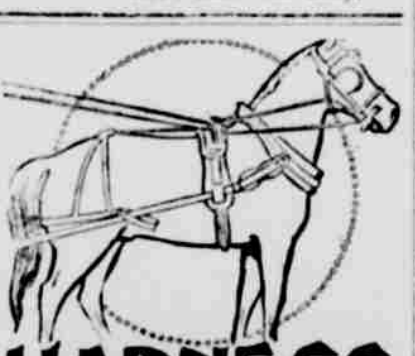
