One now often hears the question: Who is going to be our next mayor? Several have been mentioned for that honorable office, among which are the names of B. O. Lamb, Morris Leach, D. L. Shrode, Chas. Reynolds, Dr. Kerron. We have not much time to decide the matter, December 1st, is election day.

A season of petty thieving seems to have set in in this community. Locks are being broken, houses entered, chickens, wood and other commodities are being stolen. Should the authorities get their hands on any of the guilty parties they should give the full extent of the law, thereby making a good wholesome lesson of them.

Some one of Union precinct has started an innovation by depositing a package of Epsom Salts in the ballot box, addressed to Editor Baker of the Headlight. We understand that several of the Headlight's subscribers have taken the cue and will henceforth pay their subscription in the commodity above mentioned, and apparently so much needed by the editor of the Headlight.

The warm delightful weather which we are now enjoying and which we have been enjoying all fall is in striking contrast with the severe blizzards which the east and central states have recently been laboring under. It is true that it rains in Oregon, but it is also true that we have a plenty of as fine weather as any human being would wish to enjoy. The rain brings wealth and the beautiful weather gladness. What better combination should anyone ask for?

There has been an endeavor to circulate a false impression relative to the consumption of liquor. It has been heralded far and wide that the government figures proved the fact that while more territory has become dry, liquor drinking has been on the increase. This is not true for after investigation it has been discovered that the government figures prove that less drinking has been indulged in of late. The following taken from an exchange explains the matter very nicely.

"The daily papers, so generally 'wet' in their predilections, are fond of quoting statistics and assertions showing increase in the consumption of intoxicants.

"Recently a government report showed unusually large withdrawals of liquors, by wholesalers from bonded warehouses caused by legal regulations, and the papers jumped to the conclusion that consumption of liquor was increasing, whereas it was only an incidental readjustment of liquor holdings. Under national law liquor may remain in bond not longer than eight years, and must then be removed whether demanded or not. The fact that the big supplies of the stuff had remained in bond the limit of time is proof of decrease, not increase, of sales.

"When the liquor is taken from the bonded warehouses the government tax is paid, and it is then officially recorded as 'consumed,' but this does not prove that the liquor has been actually gulped down by drinkers. Most likely it is held somewhere in private warehouses awaiting a demand from retailers.

"Another point to be remembered is that all liquors recorded as 'consumed' do not go down the throats of American citizens; some of it is used for scientific, mechanical and various other purposes.

"The cheering fact of the whole matter is that while brewers, distillers and wholesalers are anxious to make believe that the 'reform wave' is subsiding, and liquor-drinking increasing, the contrary is true.

"More and more territory is coming under prohibition. Nine states are comparatively dry. The consumption of liquor in wet states is over 25 gallons per capita, in dry states it is less than 1 1-2 gallons.

"Of the remaining 39 states, 36 are under some form of local option. This means that two-thirds of the geographical area of the United States is dry territory and that over one-half the population is living under prohibition.

"Best of all, there are more temperance people in the country than ever

before, and their voices are counting for more in municipal government and in general legislation than ever before.

"Were the secular daily papers only won over from the enemy, what a temperance forward march there would soon be."

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NEWS FROM OUR NATIONAL CAPITAL

Senate Banking Committee Is Likely to Report Four-Bank Plan.

Washington, D. C.—When the senate banking and currency committee ended its first week of deliberations it appeared certain that the bill to be reported to the senate would contain certain provisions for a four regional reserve, government controlled bank system, the \$100,000,000 stock of which will be offered to the public.

With progress on the fundamentals of the senate measure just begun, only the framework of the Glass-Steagall measure has been retained. The most radical change in the administration measure has been the complete removal of the regional reserve banks from bank control. Briefly, the following were the provisions of the measure, which it was believed would govern its final drafting.

Four regional reserve banks with a total capitalization of \$100,000,000, divided according to the financial location of the center from which the banks will operate.

Absolute control of the banks by the government and regional reserve boards, to be appointed by the president.

The regional reserve bank stock to bear either 5 or 6 per cent interest and to be sold to the public by subscription, the balance, if any, to be taken up by the member banks. This stock will have no voting power, and will not share in the surplus. That will accrue to the government.

Co-operation With States Proposed.

If congress, at the regular session, will authorize an additional loan of \$100,000,000 to the reclamation fund in accordance with the recommendation to be submitted by Secretary Lane, the interior department will undertake, in co-operation with the several states, to redeem those Carey act projects which have proven failures, and which threaten, without some such aid, to entail heavy loss on settlers who have undertaken to establish homes under their canals.

The plan of the interior department is to have the federal government join with the states in competing Carey act projects which have fallen into disrepair through failure of contracts or from other causes.
