To correct another misrepresentation and falsehood appearing in the Headlight in regard to Mr. Beals attempting to shift the expense of his concrete onto the city we wish to state that A. G. and F. R. Beals, much to their credit, have built in the last six months nearly 800 feet of 12 foot concrete walk and paid cash for it as fast as it was laid.

As we go to press we learn that the county court has decided on a cut of approximately \$100,000 on the budget as previously presented. We understand that in a general way the cut has been made in accordance with the wishes of the people as expressed at the meeting last Friday. The preponderance of opinion throughout the county seems to be in favor of the reduction as agreed upon at the meeting and we are sure the people generally will be pleased with the reduction as contemplated by the court.

Baker, in speaking of your spectacular flop from the dries to the wets you state that you preferred what you "honestly" believed to be the lesser of the two evils. Now, Baker, think it over again and see if you cannot recall some consideration that influenced the spectacular flop other than the honest convictions you describe. Just recall your first appearance as a saloon advocate in that special edition of the Headlight with its various contributions fathered by you, its "inspired" editorials, etc., then tell us frankly just what took place between you and the committee representing the saloon interests. The public will then be able to judge, as we are, just how much figure "honesty" cut in the matter.

There are lots in this city if they had to be sold today would not more than pay the expense of the so-called improvements made under the Harter administration. This amounts to confiscation, pure and simple. Added to this imposition is the greater imposition of the property owner having to pay for a pavement proven by the citizens to be fatally defective and admitted by the Warren Construction Co. not to be in conformity with the specifications. Baker, the arch enemy to the peace, harmony and progress of this city, contends that such a property owner must make no protest, simply submit. The Court has not said so, the voters in electing a mayor and council, all but one of them parties to the litigation, has not said so and no man that is not cracked and a knave at that would say so.

Baker, who was in a state of hysteria last week, after F. R. Beals had been declared the unanimous nominee for Mayor of the largest and most enthusiastic caucus ever held in Tillamook City, and who, in company with other lackies of the Warren Construction Co., was around over town all week in a fruitless effort to get a candidate who had the courage to accept the nomination by petition and come out against the citizens ticket, now assumes to find great solace in the fact that some of the citizens did not vote. Content with the ticket and knowing there was to be no opposition, quite naturally, they did not. A glance at the returns, however, is sufficient to show the usual twist in Baker's noddle, viz: Mr. Beals received not all of the votes but ten, as Baker says, but all of the votes

cast but four and as many votes, lacking one, as was cast for all of the five councilmen and two more votes than Mr. Gaylord, who was elected treasurer. Never were the people so united and never was a greater compliment paid to any man in the city than to Mr. Beals in the recent caucus and election.

We think we are justified in saying that no man in Tillamook City, is looked upon with as much contempt as F. C. Baker, editor of the Tillamook Headlight. At a time when he should have been giving his loyal support to H. F. Goodspeed, Henry Wolfe, W. C. King, David Martiny, S. A. Broadhead, M. W. Harrison and such unfortunates as Mesdames Allen, Stewart, Morgan, McGhee, Rees, et al, in their struggle to protect their property interests and homes from one of the most colossal grafts ever perpetrated upon a people he was engaged in misrepresenting and maligning them. In the face of Judge Campbell's verdict in favor of the citizens and the verdict of the people expressed through the recent election he is undaunted and assures the public that he expects to continue the fight. In other words, expects to continue to deliberately misrepresent Judge Campbell's decision; misrepresent and malign the above people and men who have rendered this city invaluable services; to get even with one man, publish to the world that Tillamook land values are inflated, thereby knocking and retarding the growth of the county; vilify any man that happens to incur his enmity as in the case of the late Senator Maxwell, F. R. Beals and numerous others, and anything else that might enter a warped and diseased mind filled with malice and revenge.

This paper does not intend to dignify Baker by giving any space to a discussion of what he publishes further than to keep the public mind clear as to the facts in any malicious, dirty assault he may make upon the character and reputation of our citizens or matters that involve the public welfare. This far and no farther we shall recognize him or the senseless controversies he constantly carries on through his paper.

FALL REFORESTATION ENDS IN TILLAMOOK

Fall reforestation work on Mount Hebo in southern Tillamook county in the Siuslaw national forest, which has been carried on under the direction of Portland officials of the United States forest service, has been completed.

The reforested area covers approximately 1100 acres of 400 acres were seeded and 700 acres planted with young trees. Operations commenced about the middle of September, and since that date up to the present time a crew carrying from 25 to 30 men has been constantly engaged in the work.

The forest service plans to continue this work again next spring, when several hundred additional acres are to be covered. This is the fourth year that the work has been going on in the Mount Hebo region, the first having been undertaken in the fall of 1910. Work has been carried on subsequently in both spring and fall of the years following.

reduction in the budget were led by W. G. Dwight, Russel Hawkins, Mr. Haak and several others and resulted in the budget being cut about \$85,000. It is now up to the county court to take cognizance of the proceedings of last Friday and re-arrange the budget to conform to the wishes of the taxpayers as emphasized. The budget as first estimated totaled \$464,227.78.

The Bay City Meeting.

Bay City, Oregon, November 28th 1913.—Pursuant to call signed C. V. Stoker, N. McMillan, A. Zuercher and fourteen other taxpayers of Garibaldi and the Miami Valley, some thirty taxpayers met at the City Hall in Bay City on the above date to consider the tax levy proposed by the County Court and such other business affecting the county welfare as might come before the meeting. On motion Mayor W. H. Gilmore was called to the chair and Mr. W. G. Dwight chosen as Secretary of the meeting.

The budget as prepared and published by the County Court was then read and after a general discussion a committee of three consisting of William Kennedy, C. V. Stoker and Wesley Day was appointed to draft and submit to the meeting, resolutions embodying the wishes of the meeting, which the committee did as follows: That the estimate for roads be reduced from \$150,400 to \$125,000. Bridges from \$41,000 to \$25,000. Court House repairs etc. from \$32,000 to \$6,000, and that the estimate of \$25,000, for poor farm etc. be stricken out. On motion the report was adopted.

The following resolution was introduced by Mr. Bozorth and unanimously adopted, to-wit: Resolved that it is the opinion of this meeting that the County Court of Tillamook County, Oregon, should secure, forthwith the services of a road engineer from the Office of Public Roads in the Department of Agriculture at Washington, D. C. to advise and counsel with the County Court in the matter of building of new roads and the repairing of old roads and bridges in the county, it being understood that the services of such a man may be had without cost to the County.

No further business appearing the meeting, on motion, adjourned.
