Little Rock, Ark., Dec. 3.—The Ma-
 sonic grand lodge of Arkansas has
 adopted a resolution making it a Ma-
 sonic offence for any member of the
 order to sign a petition for the grant-
 ing of a saloon license or to circulate
 such a petition. This was announced
 by Grand Secretary Fay Hempstead.

According to laws adopted at last
 session of the Arkansas legislature, a
 petition signed by a majority of the
 white adults of a community is a re-
 quisite to the issuance of a saloon li-
 cense.

Tillamook Clover Increased by Gypsum Lami Plaster.

 or soil-bearing plants, do not make
 satisfactory growth. The presence of
 these bacteria is indicated by small
 nodules on the roots of the plants. The
 activity of these bacteria is favored
 by a neutral or alkaline soil. Now
 the sulphate of potash set free in the
 soil by Gypsum changes to carbonate
 of potash, and renders the soil very
 slightly alkaline, which favors this
 bacterial activity. GYPSUM BE-
 COMES THEN A SPECIFIC FOR IN-
 CREASING THE YIELD OF LEGUM-
 ES.

Dr. James Withycombe, Director of
 the Oregon Experiment Station, re-
 ports yields from an acre of fall sown
 Vetch, which received an application
 of 100 pounds of Gypsum April 17, and
 yielded 9,031 pounds of Hay July 11, as
 compared with a yield of 7,394 pounds
 of Hay from an adjoining acre, used as
 a check. This was an increase of 22
 per cent in favor of Gypsum.

 Turnips, Hemp, Flax and Maize.

WHERE MILK IS CHEAP
 Oregon Agricultural College, Corvallis, Ore., Dec.—The average price of milk in twenty-six of the leading cities of the United States, is 3.56 cents per quart, according to the table of prices recently prepared by the United States Statistical Bureau. The average price received by the farmer and dairyman was but 2.9 cents per quart. Compared with prices in Oregon, the average city price seems remarkably low. The Dairy department of the Agricultural College sells direct to consumers at about 9 cents per quart, which price is perhaps a fair average for the entire state.
