Catholic Church Nearing Completion.

Beautiful Stained Windows, and Cross now in Place. Cross weighing 350 Pounds. Covered With Solid Gold Leaf.

The New Catholic Church is nearing completion, and it is certainly a thing of beauty. Contractor Melchior says that it is impossible to tell just when it will be entirely completed as the furnace which has been ordered for sometime has not yet arrived.

J. E. Povey of the firm of Povey Bros. of Portland who furnished the windows for the church is in the city. He has just finished placing the windows which are beautiful works of art.

The cross which weighs 350 pounds and is covered with solid gold leaf has also been put in place and adds much to the appearance of the church.

The new building which will cost when completed, nearly \$10,000, has a seating capacity of nearly 500. It is made of cement bricks and is finished in Oregon fir. The new building is an ornament to the city and reflects much to the credit of those who have had the work of construction in charge.

TAX LEVY TO BE 4.365 MILLS

Estimated Expense of State for 1914 is \$4,105,000.

Salem.—The tax commission, in making public the state tax levy for the fiscal year ending December 31, 1914, announced that the total amount of revenue required for the general state purposes for the year, not including amounts apportioned on a special mileage basis, would be \$3,885,258.10.

Added to that sum will be a tax of one twenty-fifth of a mill, yielding \$28,171.90, for the Monmouth normal school, and a tax of one-fourth of a mill, yielding \$228,570.60, for the state road fund, making the total amount needed \$4,141,999.60.

To raise this money the average rate of taxation on all property in the state will be a little more than four and one-third mills, or, to be exact, 4.365. The rates in the various counties will vary widely, depending on the relation of assessed to full cash value of the property in each county. The lowest will be 3.1 mills and the highest 5.6 mills.

Finer University is Aim.

Eugene.—"What the board of regents intends to do is to build a university that the state will be proud of for years to come," declared Governor West in explanation of the decision of the regents, who met at the university to delay taking steps for the construction of the \$100,000 building, funds for which were approved by the people at the recent referendum election.

Grants Pass Plans Annual Shoot.

Grants Pass.—The local gun club is making arrangements to hold an annual shoot at this place on December 21. The day's work will include both shotgun and rifle practice. For shotgun practice flying targets will be used. Cash prizes will be offered as well as other prizes yet to be determined.

Self-Defense is Proved.

McMinnville.—"Not Guilty" was the verdict of the jury that sat on the trial of James Hutchens, who was indicted for murder in the first degree for the shooting of Walter A. Rodgers. The jury was out about two hours and when the verdict was read by Judge Holmes the audience applauded for three minutes.

Union is Quarantined.

Union.—The city of Union has been placed under quarantine and all places of gathering suppressed, including shows, churches, dances and lodges. These drastic measures were deemed necessary by the city authorities to prevent the further spread of scarlet fever, which has gained considerable headway in the town.

Mines Near Baker Busy.

Baker.—Activity such as has not been seen in years in the Mormon Basin country is being shown, and several mining properties show bright prospects. Estimates have been made that there are at least 250 men now working there, and that by next summer there will be as many more.

LIQUOR MEN LOSE CASE

Judge Bean Rules "Becke" Cannot Be Shipped Into Dry Zone.

Portland, Or.—A transportation company is not compelled to accept shipments of liquor into "dry" territory, according to a decision rendered in United States district court by Judge Bean in the case of F. Zimmerman & Co. against the O. W. R. & N. and the Oregon Short Line.

Plaintiff asked that the railroad companies be compelled to accept liquor at Portland, consigned to Heyburn, Idaho. The railroads had refused to accept the shipment because of the Webb-Kenyon act, which prohibits the shipment of liquor into "dry" territory from another state.

Danger of Hindu Invasion is Seen.

Portland, Or.—A warning that the United States is in danger of a Hindu immigration invasion, similar to that of the Japanese and Chinese, unless the Hindus are made an excluded class, was sounded by Anthony Caminetti, United States commissioner general of immigration, while in Portland. The commissioner general is on an official tour of the west.

California Progressives Meet.

San Francisco.—From every congressional district of California the progressives of the state met here in party conference, repudiated their one-time "affiliation" with the national republicans, cheered their leader.

Governor Aids in Making Salem Dry.

Salem, Or.—Governor West took a hand in the fight to make the town "dry," and, as a result, the city council instructed the mayor and city attorney to inform the management of the Salem brewery and two fraternal organizations which have club houses that they would be prosecuted unless they ceased selling intoxicating beverages. The brewery, it is charged, has been delivering beer at residences, and the clubs have been selling intoxicating drinks the same as before the people voted the city "dry."

Two Shot in Duel.

Salem.—John Zoller, marshal of Gervais, is believed to be dying from a wound in the neck and left shoulder received in a pistol duel which occurred when he approached two suspicious characters. Ray McCarroll, arrested several hours after the shooting in this city, has made a complete confession to Sheriff Bech, but declares it was his companion who shot the marshal. McCarroll has two bullet wounds in his left shoulder, but his condition is not serious.

New Masonic Building Completed

The lodge room is beautifully decorated, the walls being tinted an olive gray with white trimmings. Sixteen bronze chandeliers hang from the ceiling, lighting the hall with much brightness when all are lit. The work of decorating the hall was done by Kelson and Cardiff and is of much credit to them.

The frontage of the new building is lighted by night with five cluster lights which are a great improvement and ornament to the building and street.
