

## COMMITTEE WILL HAVE FULL CHARGE

**Has Full Power to Adjust Composition of Republican National Convention.**

Washington.—After five hours of debate the republican national committee determined that it was clothed with ample power to readjust the composition of the party's national conventions and had authority to make reforms in convention rules and procedure that have been demanded by many elements since the convention of 1912.

Without a dissenting vote the committee decided to make a change in the basis of representation in national conventions which will greatly affect southern states, gave full recognition to the principle of the primary in the election of delegates to such conventions, approved laws regarding such elections adopted by several states which provide that all delegates be selected at large and accepted the principle that delegates properly accredited by state authorities shall be placed on the temporary convention roll.

The only difference of opinion that developed on the surface was over the question of the machinery to be used to effect the reform. Of the 42 committeemen who voted on the one roll call taken, 14 favored the calling of a special convention to bring about the changes, and 35 declared themselves opposed.

### BRIEF NEWS OF THE WEEK

The radicals ruled the New York republican state conference and forced the approval of a direct or state-wide primary law.

Because they had ridden Mrs. John Richardson on a rail following the linking of her name with that of her brother-in-law, five gray-haired women of Waukegan, Ill., were convicted and each may be fined \$200 and sentenced to six months in jail.

It is announced that nearly all the hotel owners of San Francisco, representing more than 1200 hostilities, have agreed with the Panama-Pacific exposition officials that prices for rooms will not be increased over those of the present, on account of the 1915 fair.

Telephone securities were given a jolt in the stock market when Wall Street heard the report that Samuel Hill, head of the Home Telephone company of Portland, Or., was actively engaged in merging the independent telephone companies of the United States with the Postal Telegraph company.

Declaring that intimately personal subjects should be taught to children at home by their parents, the Parents Rights League of America, organized in San Francisco to combat the introduction of "sex hygiene" instruction and medical inspection in the public schools, will issue a call to all mothers.

Prohibition forces from all over the country gathered in Washington Wednesday for a mighty demonstration before the national capitol. More than 2000 men and women, members of the Anti-Saloon League of America and the Women's Christian Temperance Union, marched in separate bodies to the capital bearing petitions demanding national prohibition by constitutional amendment.

William Dearing, the harvester manufacturer, died at Miami, Fla., his winter home.

"Bud" Anderson, of Vancouver, Wash., knocked out Frank Barbour, of Vancouver, B. C., in the 10th round of a scheduled 20-round contest at Vernon arena in Los Angeles.

Andrew Carnegie's secretary figures that the iron master has given away \$366,125,000 out of a fortune originally of \$380,125,000.

The release of ex-President Zelaya, who was arrested in New York, charged with murder in his own land, was authorized by order of the department, on condition that he sail on the first boat for Spain.

Indictments charging graft in connection with building highways in New York have been returned by the special grand jury against Arthur McLean, treasurer of the democratic state central committee.

Boys and girls are advised to stick to the farm by Champ Clark, speaker of the house, addressing a meeting of corn growers. Senator Pomerene says, if he were a girl, he would rather bake a good loaf of bread than dance the tango.

Two cowboys, suspected of robbing the Verde Valley bank at Blythe, of \$5000, and killing Cashier A. W. Bowles, were arrested at El Centro, Cal. The suspects had in their possession between \$4500 and \$5000 in gold.

Oklahoma City, Okla.—Al Jennings, reformed bandit and train robber, who is now a respected attorney at law, will be a candidate for the democratic nomination for governor of Oklahoma next year.

### LAWYER NEWS OF TUESDAY

Frank Simmons is suspected of having killed his mother, cousin and himself in a cottage in Portland. The bodies were found by a 12-year-old girl of the family.

Governor West is considering the plan of providing unemployed men with work crews hopped off land that is in condition.

State dairy and food commissioners will start a war on all dealers who are said to be selling imports.

Corporation Commissioner Watson has instituted in the supreme court mandamus proceedings against State Treasurer May to compel him to issue a warrant for legal services issued to Claude McFall, state senator and assistant of the corporation commission.

The Pacific Coast Rescue mission of Portland has filed a request with the Pendleton Commercial club for the currence of 1914 of the jackrabbits to be killed during the rabbit drives in Umatilla county, and these will be used for food in the mission stations in the cities of the coast. The Pendleton club has promised to ship the rabbits after each drive.


