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ASAHIEL BUSH'S WILL

SALEM, Ore., Dec. 30.—In his own
handwriting, on two sheets of fool-
scap paper and one letterhead of
the bank founded by him, the will
of the late Asahiel Bush, pioneer
banker and editor, disposing of an
estate valued at \$2,000,000, was
filed for probate today.

Asahiel N. Bush, a son, who is in
active charge of the Ladd & Bush
Bank of this city, is to get almost
two-thirds of the estate, Miss Sally
Bush, a daughter, having a one-
third interest and the homestead in
this city. Mrs. Estella Bush Thayer,
another daughter, is to get \$2500
annually, and a fund of \$5000 an-
nually is provided for the main-
tenance of Miss Eugenia Bush an
invalid. It is reported that Mrs.
Thayer was provided for addition-
ally in separate gifts made after
the will was drawn.

The will was executed July 20,
1889, and a codicil, relating to the
annuity for maintenance of Miss
Eugenia Bush, was added Novem-
ber 13, 1905. S. A. Sanford and
Clair Gatch witnessed the signing
of the will, and Clair Gatch and J.
Baumgartner the signing of the
codicil.

TILLAMOOK RETAINS LAURELS AS CHEESE PRODUCING COUNTY.

Records available at this time show
that this county has maintained its
high records in cheese output, both as
to quantity and quality during the year
now closing. Complete returns for the
year will not be accessible until the
beginning of February, but from the
data now at hand it is evident that the
total output of the county will be
close to 4,000,000 pounds of cheese for
the year and the total revenue will ap-
proximate \$650,000.

The average price paid to the farmers
for butter fat last year—41.2 cents per
pound—was far in excess of previous
records. Cheese prices during the sum-
mer months of this year have been
even higher than a year ago and it is
during this season that the greatest
amount of cheese is produced. Many
of the larger factories have paid 40
cents per pound or more during every
month this year. And the price paid to
the farmers is computed after all ex-
penses of manufacture and selling have
been taken care of.

Even the number of pounds of cheese
produced from each 100 pounds of milk
is increasing annually. In 1911 an av-
erage of 10.83 pounds of cheese were
produced from each 100 pounds of milk
received at the factories. In 1912 the
average was 11.03 pounds. A few
years ago, 9 1/2 pounds per 100 was con-
sidered a good yield. In most of the
eastern states less than 10 pounds are
produced. The increase in yield is
largely due to inspection and standard
methods of manufacture that have been
established.

Dairymen are displaying more in-
terest in their vocation than ever be-
fore. The county fair, early in Sep-
tember, was well patronized although
a severe storm delayed the opening for
several days. meetings called for the
discussion of demonstration farms have
been well attended and two of the
granges have passed resolutions re-
questing the county court to establish
a demonstration farm in the county.

Tillamook county cheese was display-
ed and won prizes at the state fairs of
Oregon, Washington and California
and at the Northwest Dairy Show at
Spokane. In another year it is prob-
able that the National Dairy Show at
Chicago will be included in the list.
For the first time in history, a local
dairymen heads the State Dairymen's
association. This honor has fallen to
Charles Kunze, one of the most pro-
gressive dairymen of the county.

It has been frequently said that each
acre of bottom land in this country is
capable of supporting a cow and this
is the goal toward which local dairy-
men are aiming. Feeding the proper
proportion of the elements, the value
of silage—all these things are receiv-
ing marked attention.

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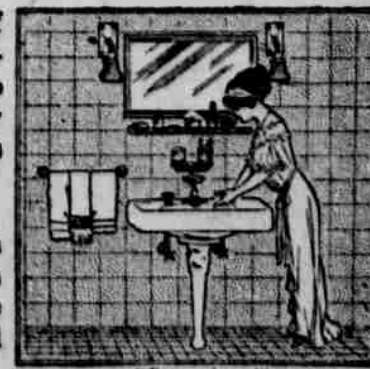
