TIM HEALEY, HUSBAND OF TILLAMOOK GIRL SHOT.

On Tuesday evening while Tim Healey, a Portland Policeman was on duty on Portland Heights he was shot by two desperados. His injuries are very serious. Mr. Healey known as "Big Tim," was married a few months ago to Miss Dena Plasker, a well known Tillamook girl.
 Telegrams in regard to the shooting were received at this city on Wednesday and on Thursday morning John Plasker accompanied by Miss Mena Plasker and Mrs. Chas. Kuper, left for Portland to be with their sister during her trouble.
 Mr. Healey noticed two men acting queerly near the residence of John A. Keating. He began to question them whereupon they drew revolvers and began shooting at close range, one ball striking Healey in the shoulder and one in the abdomen. Healey shot one of the men who was picked up later. The other man got away.
 Healey's wounds are very serious, especially the one in the abdomen, the intestines being punctured twelve times. He is being cared for at St. Vincent's Hospital and at last report was improving some.

BAY CITY CANNERY CLOSED INDEFINITELY.

Operations at the Oregon Fisheries Company's cannery ceased for an indefinite period last Tuesday evening, and it is certain will not be opened again until some definite settlement can be arrived at between the fishermen and the operators as to the price to be paid by the company for crabs.
 Since the company has been canning the crabs here, covering perhaps a month, it has been allowing the fishermen forty cents per dozen, accepting anything that was brought in that was of sufficient size for canning purposes. Tuesday, however, the company declared its intention of reducing the scale to twenty-five cents per dozen and the fishermen rebelled, declaring that other canneries on the coast were paying forty cents for the crustaceans of a quality not superior to those gathered here.
 The company's agent on their part declare that the reduction is necessary to make the industry a profitable one, as the crabs delivered are not large and that the company has been hiring white help for pickers and endeavoring to compete against the Japanese labor employed by other institutions. The company has offered to pay thirty cents per dozen for crabs up to eight inches and forty cents for anything larger.

Testing Association Elects Officers

Year's Work Reviewed and Discussed. Business Men Donate Prizes.
 On Thursday afternoon the Tillamook Cow Testing Association met and elected officers for the ensuing year and discussed and transacted other important business.
 The following officers were elected: Chas. Kunze, chairman; J. S. Durer, Secretary, John Schilder, Treas.
 At the opening of the meeting chairman Kunze announced that Prof. Graves, of the Dairy Department of the Agricultural College, who was scheduled to be present at the meeting and give an address, could not be present on account of unavoidable circumstances. This announcement was a great disappointment to the dairymen present. Many of our dairymen are taking a great interest in the business, and are anxious for any knowledge that they may be able to gain. Prof. Graves was on the program for an address on the subject: A Balanced Ration for Milk Cows.
 Regardless of the disappointment because of Prof. Graves' absence, those present took up the discussion of different matters in connection with the association, with interest, and there is no doubt but that much good resulted from the meeting.
 A large sum has been donated for prizes to be given to those having the highest testing cows this year. The following donations have been made: Chas. Kunze, \$50.00; C. I. Clough, \$30.00; Tillamook Feed Co., \$10.00; Friend, \$10.00; Tillamook Cow Testing Association, \$50.00. This prize money will be distributed in two different lots; the first \$100.00 will be divided into \$50.00, \$30.00 and \$20.00 prizes and will go to the owners of the three cows of the association which produce the largest amount of butter fat for the year. The \$50.00 donated by the Cow Testing Association will be divided into \$25.00, \$15.00 and \$10.00 prizes and will go to the two year old heifers producing the most butterfat for the year.
 The matter of the distribution of the prizes and the requirements of the contest, will be given out later, or as soon as those who have the matter in charge have given the subject necessary thought and consideration.
 The Cow Testing Association has not yet got quite the necessary number of members with which to begin the year's work, so there is still an opportunity for others to join.
 We understand that Coos County now has two testing associations and is about to form a third one. The supporting of these associations are in line with up-to-date methods and should be encouraged in every way.
