the mothers clearer knowledge of the baby's needs.
"To save children from every disease which, with proper parental knowledge and care may be prevented.
"To save children from entering lives of crime by instructing parents in methods of teaching Sex Hygiene.
"To give parents an opportunity to gain knowledge in—
Parental Culture,
Maternal Education,
Infant Hygiene,
Sex Problems,
Healthful Reproduction;
By the following methods—
Talk by Physicians,
Demonstrations by nurses,
Private Consultations,
Distribution of Literature.
The literature consists of leaflets bearing upon parenthood and education in rearing children to the fullest development, mentally, morally and physically."
While the work of the State Fairs Committee will be that of conducting Child Welfare Booths, similar to that maintained at the State Fair, with Eugenics when possible, and may be organized under any name and constitution preferred, yet it is especially recommended that as an affiliation of the State Parent-Teacher Associations its services would be of inestimable value to Superintendents and Principals of all of the schools, and their cooperation would in turn be of much value to your organization. In case there is already an organization that has appointed a State Fairs Committee they can do this work without changing their name and constitution.
As Vice Chairman your services will consist of appointing sub-committees and getting them into working operation. "You want to establish a system of dividing and sub-dividing until every school precinct has been reached. By adopting this plan of "multiplying by dividing" it will minimize the work to the extent that it will be a service of pleasure instead of an arduous duty.
I will enclose a few extra copies of this letter which can be disseminated among outside Committees, thereby facilitating your work. I leave it to your own judgment as to whether you will have all requests for information, helps of reports sent to you and you forward to this office, or whether they shall be addressed to me from the respective centers. I will say, however, that by sending to you first it would put you in closer touch with your Committee workers and keep you informed as to their requirements and progress.
All applications for literature, including loan papers, should be sent to Mrs. I. M. Walker, 551 County Court House, Portland. All Committees should have a publicity department, whose duty it will be to attend to getting all information concerning this movement published in their local papers and it is the wish of the Portland Committee that copies of said publications be sent us and we will try to get reprints in our own papers. We want to get the public to understand the full import of our work, and this advertising will serve a good purpose later on.
A series of bulletins will be sent out from this office and further communications of interest will go later, also. For reporting progress, or for any other information, please address me, 551 County Court House, Portland, Oregon.
