NEW GARAGE TO BE ERECTED

A contract was let on Tuesday evening by Charley Kennedy to Delaman & Dolaf to construct a modern concrete garage 40 x 70 feet on a site recently purchased by Kennedy on 2nd Ave. and 9th Street. The location is a good one and is on the main route of travel through the city.

The building will be of solid concrete construction, 40 x 70 feet, with walls 10 feet high and 6 inches thick, the floor being of solid concrete 6 inches thick. The building will be well lighted with numerous and generous size windows.

The contract calls for the building to be completed within forty days. Charley Kennedy's present garage is too small to accommodate his rapidly growing business, and the present building he will move across the street and in the rear of the building he has just let the contract for. There are at present over a hundred automobiles in Tillamook vicinity and the tourist travel each year is increasing into this county on account of good roads, and we are of the opinion that Mr. Kennedy has made a move in the right line.

EXPERT EXAMINES SEWERS

Wm Allison, professor of sanitary and hydraulic engineering of Eugene, in company with the mayor and the council has been making some investigations of our sanitary sewer.

Prof. Allison claims that the sanitary sewer is very defective and that he has read the plans and specifications for the construction of the sewer and finds that The Warren Construction Co. and its sub-contractors have failed to construct the sewer according to contract.

A Sanitary sewer is supposed to be practically water tight, however, upon investigating five or six joints of pipe which were uncovered in two different places on 6th street, between two manholes, every joint uncovered leaked water. An idea of the leakage was obtained from the fact that the sewer was plugged at the lower manhole and left over night. The next morning the surface water stood twenty inches deep over the pipe that had been uncovered. When the plug was removed from the lower manhole it required only 10 minutes for all the water to drain into the sewer out of the holes that had been dug, each hole being about 10 feet long. This water run in through the joints that were supposed to be water tight.

Prof. Allison says that it will be a great mistake for the city to pay for the sewer, and that the contract was let for \$12,000 more than the sewer could be worth under any consideration, and further that had the contract been let for \$12,000 less than the contract price of \$47,000 the contractors would have made a fine margin for themselves.

Prof. Allison's opinion confirms the report made by engineer Richardson, which was to the effect that the sewer should have cost much less than \$47,000.

A more detailed report in regard to the investigation will be given later. This investigation is being made in pursuant to recommendations made in the mayor's message.

MRS. JENNIE T. GALLETINE DEAD

We are sorry to announce the death of Mrs. Jennie T. Galletine, sister of Attorney C. W. Talmage, which occurred in Tillamook City on Thursday afternoon, after a short illness. The deceased was born in Kendall County, Ill., on September 6, 1851, and came to Oregon with her parents, Mr. and Mrs. C. Talmage, who located in Washington County, the following year. She was married to William P. Galletine at Amity, Yamhill Co., Ore., in 1868 and two children survive her, Mrs. Dahlgren, of Tillamook, and Mrs. Hopkins, of Milwaukie, Ore. For the past five years she has been living with her brother, Attorney C. W. Talmage, of this city. The remains will be taken to McMinnville on Saturday and buried in the family lot there. The deceased was a kind, good woman, beloved by all who knew her, and she possessed the true Christian graces. The bereaved family have the sympathy of the community.
