The Progressives are booming Theodore Roosevelt for governor of New York next fall, with a view to his nomination for president in 1916. Will history repeat itself? Cleveland and Roosevelt once before, found the New York governorship a stepping-stone to the White House. Intimate friends of the Colonel have expressed the opinion that he would run for the presidency if the call was strong enough.

The passage of the Alaskan Railroad Bill is now assured, and in consequence the whole northwest is congratulating Senator Chamberlain for his untiring efforts in getting this bill through congress.

The construction of this railroad which will cost thirty-five million or more will be of vast importance to Oregon and Washington as it will open up vast coal fields which will supply our manufacturing centers with cheaper fuel, and will open up a large area of undeveloped country which will no doubt prove a splendid market for many of our products.

Senator Chamberlain has been doing some good work in the senate and his services should be appreciated. He has been severely criticised by the stand pat press for his action in voting with the administration for the lowering of the tariff on some of Oregon's products, but that criticism is growing less in view of the fact that the welfare of our industries have not been affected in the least by the reduction in the tariff. Wool is higher than it ever was; dairy products are demanding top notch prices, and the lumber market is firm.

In considering the revision of the tariff the administration had to consider the needs of the nation from a nation wide and world wide standpoint. As civilization advances the needs of the world as a whole are becoming greater and this must needs have an influence on our affairs. When we look into the matter we discover that prices in all parts of the world are on the upgrade and there is a demand for the first class staple articles every where. For this reason the expected invasion of foreign made goods has not taken place. The new tariff simply places our manufacturers in a position where they must meet the competition of the world and in consequence, in many instances, make a better article. In other words give the people more for their money.

Every ship that brings a load of foreign produce to our shores, must of necessity take from us a load of our produce if the transaction is to be made profitable. Thus in letting down the bars and inviting foreigners competition we will of necessity open up new markets for our goods.

The administration has been criticised because of the fact that tariff revision has been done for the benefit of the east at the expense of the west. This criticism seems inconsistent to us. A prosperous east means plenty of money for western developments, and we are receiving benefits from this source at the present time. Our nation is a large one, and in making a tariff law much has to be taken into consideration. Conditions are adjusting themselves fast to the new tariff law which is proving itself to be what the administration wants it to be: A help not a hindrance to trade. Senator Chamberlain did well to stand by the administration in this matter.

## MUSSELS GOOD TO EAT.

Down with the high cost of living; the humble and long despised mussel of the Oregon coast is to be made a table delicacy. Its use as an item of regular diet and its propagation for commercial purposes is urged by no less an authority than Dr. Clifton F. Hodge, professor of civic biology at the University of Oregon and a biologist of even more than national repute.

The mussel is tasteful, easy to procure, cheap and nutritious," says Dr. Hodge. "It is better than a clam and is as good as the oyster. There is no reason why it should be neglected. Mussel raising should be an Oregon industry."

The mussel exists along the Oregon coast but to what extent Dr. Hodge, who came to the state university only last October, has not yet had time to investigate. He has picked up specimens on the beach at Bandon and believes this sea food is probably to be found in all the Oregon coast counties—Clatsop, Tillamook, Lincoln, Lane, Coos and Curry and Douglas.

The mussel does not frighten European Mediterranean regions. Boys in Naples bay dive and bring up specimens no larger than a thumb, which they market. The French have had a method of cultivating mussels that dates back to 1035. It is estimated that \$1,000,000 worth of mussels are used for food annually in Paris alone.

Mussels grow in great beds, where they have been introduced or are indigenous.

These beds are often acres in extent, on the surface of mud or sand, extending out from between tide marks to several fathoms of water. At Narragansett alone on the Atlantic coast, there are 1100 acres of sea mussel beds. From 6000 to 8000 bushels of this sea food grow on a single acre, and in Massachusetts 25 cents will supply enough for ten persons for one meal.

Fear that mussels were poisonous has kept many people from them. Early settlers in America found the Indians superstitiously avoiding them, and the prejudice has continued since by Oregonians who can locate a mussel. Mash the mussels thoroughly; put in a hermetically covered kettle with a little pepper; cook ten minutes, drain the liquor and make a marinere sauce, as follows: Chop an onion very fine, fry it to a golden brown in a little butter, add a little flour and add the broth. Boil a few minutes. Add a little chopped parsley and pour on the mussels, previously laid on a platter after top shell has been removed.
