### Brief News of the Week

The Ohio female labor law was declared constitutional by the federal supreme court.

The United States circuit court on appeals at San Francisco upheld the act of March 4, 1907, prohibiting the railroads from keeping their employees on duty more than 16 hours.

The sum of \$20,875,000 was realized from the viticulture products of California last year, \$15,000,000 being obtained from wineries and \$7,000,000 from table grapes.
