Tennis Club Organized; The Junior Annual is Being Compiled; Interest in Baseball Awakening

The interest in tennis, much augmented by sunshine and spring air, rose to such a height that enough pressure was brought to bear to cause a meeting to be called for considering the organization of a Tennis Club. The plan was favorably received and a committee was appointed to draw up a Constitution and By-Laws. The committee has finished its work, and the Constitution having been accepted is now open for signing. The School Board gave their permission to allow two courts to be constructed on the south side of the school building. This is the best possible location for the court as it will here be protected from the northwest wind. From all indications a very successful year should be enjoyed by the school in tennis.

The Junior Annual is receiving every support from the school now, as the time left for its preparation is short. But the Juniors have been busy and the work is so well under way that unless some horrible and impossible accident occurs it will be a great success. This is the biggest undertaking that any class has ever entered upon. The plans call for a book that any High School might well be proud of. According to the specifications, the Annual will be a volume of 100 pages, containing 120 pages, and over 140 pictures. Three hundred copies will be printed and upon commencement day they will be ready for sale.

To help draw out the literary talent of the school, Miss DeBar has offered eight points on a monthly grade for any poem or story written by the students of any class, that will pass muster for the Annual.
