## COMMUNICATION

Portland, Ore., Jan. 20th, 1914.  
To the Editor:  
Being proud of the fact that I formerly called Tillamook my home you will kindly publish my article in your columns, offering a few suggestions to your people, who in a few short months will have the honor of entertaining soldiers coming from all parts of the state as their guests. Though they may be old and decrepit they are but a very small remnant of what was once a mighty army whose martial tread shook the earth.

Men who in the prime of their manhood sacrificed all that was near and dear to the human heart, in order that this nation might live and prosper and who after four long years of suffering untold hardships, privations and dangers finally succeeded in overcoming as free a discriminated and self-sacrificed army of brave men as ever interested for mortal combat.

War always demands the very flower of the race and the best men of a nation. Finally returning, those not killed in action to their homes, maimed and suffering from disease, unable to cope in the battles of life with those who remained at home accumulating wealth and power.

A small number of those who passed through that terrible ordeal half a century ago will meet in their annual state Encampment in your City on June 15th, 17th and 18th, and they are looking with bright anticipations for a good time. Then provide your guests with fresh vegetables grown on your rich soils; fishes from your streams and bays; dairy products from your blooded stock, then let those who have automobiles and other conveyances for local transportation take the visitors out over your good roads, through your broad valleys, show them your rich pastures and fine dairy herds, your extensive cranberries and cheese factories where the world's famous cheese is produced.

Show them your standing timber and beautiful streams of pure water; your lovely bays and ocean beaches with their many attractive watering places and summer resorts, where the invalid renews life and health as well as rest and pleasures from inhaling the pure ozone laden atmosphere; point out your grand mountains with their sides clothed with forests of valuable timber, or furnishing the grazing grounds for the flocks of prosperous farmers, all of which will leave a lasting impression upon the minds of the strangers and have a tendency of bringing other conventions to your city as many of the delegates to the Encampment are prominent members of other organizations when they could induce to meet in Tillamook as there is nothing that will bring outside money to any city like large conventions.

While circuses and migratory shows always carry away the people's money besides all societies usually select their best members to represent them as delegates, who on returning to their various localities would give the most glowing reports of what they saw and learned regarding the inducements offered and courtesies extended, which would be the means of bringing many to your county some of whom would make investments, build homes and spend their declining years in ease and comfort among your people.
