**French Minister's Wife Kills Editor**

Paris—Gaston Calmette, editor of the Figaro, was shot and killed by Mme. Henrietta Caillaux, wife of Jose Caillaux, the French minister of finance. Mme. Caillaux went to the office of the Figaro to carry out a act of vengeance against M. Calmette, who had been waging a campaign characterized by extreme bitterness against the minister of finance. She fired at least three times. M. Calmette being wounded in the chest, in the side and the abdomen.

In her statement to the police, Mme. Caillaux explained that the campaign against her husband had become intolerable and she determined to stop it. She consulted an eminent lawyer, who advised her that legal proceedings would be futile—that they were often worse in the case of the innocent than in the case of the guilty. She decided then to take the law into her own hands. She bought a revolver, drove to the Figaro office and sent in her card.

M. Calmette was most polite and asked what he could do for her. "It is needless for me to pretend that I am making a friendly call," she answered. "Then I drew my revolver from my muff and fired all the cartridges. M. Calmette tried to take shelter behind a desk."

**COLLAPSE OF RUINS KILLS 2**

Fated St. Louis Athletic Club Building Causes Additional Casualties.

St. Louis—Two persons were killed, 15 were buried under debris and about 20 others were injured when the west wall of the Missouri Athletic Club building, which was destroyed by fire a week ago, collapsed and crashed through a four-story building occupied by the St. Louis Seed company. A 20-mile wind caused the collapse of the wall, which was seven stories high.

A few minutes before the collapse Building Commissioner McKelvey, who was directing 170 men in the work of exploring the ruins of the club, feared the wall would fall and ordered his men from the debris. The action probably prevented a heavy loss of life.

The four-story building occupied by the St. Louis Seed company had weakened, apparently during the burning of the Missouri Athletic Club building, which adjoined it on the east, and when the brick wall crashed on the roof of the four-story building the walls of the latter gave way and all above the second floor crumbled.

**BRIEF NEWS OF OREGON**

A bounty on flies is going to be offered by the Salem commercial club to the school children in Salem.

Senator Chamberlain has been requested to use his influence to have the Dead Ox project included in the Owyhee project.

Bids will be opened April 1 at St. Helens for the \$300,000 bond issue recently voted by Columbia county for permanent highway construction.

Dairy cows in Coos county this year are selling for a much higher price than ever before, due to the increase in the dairy business and the efforts to better the grade of the dairy stock.

The county in which a schoolhouse is located has jurisdiction in trying cases of crime in or near the building, according to an opinion of Attorney-General Crawford.

The Corvallis commercial club has started a campaign to increase its membership to 500 and to become more effective in developing Corvallis and Benton county commercially.

Counties which have collected interest on delinquent taxes without dividing it with its taxpaying districts may be sued by the districts for their share of the money, so Attorney-General Crawford decides.

A false reading of a Babcock butter test is a violation of the weights and measures law, according to an opinion written by Attorney-General Crawford for Deputy State Sealer of Weights and Measures Buchtel.

Citizens of Glendale have organized the Glendale-Cow Creek Good Roads association, of which Mayor Coe of Glendale is president. The association starts off with a membership of 25.

The Portland chamber of commerce has filed a protest with the Oregon delegation against the proposed removal from Portland of the pure-food laboratory of the department of agriculture. The delegation will try to have the order of removal rescinded.

That there are thousands of acres of fine land in Oregon from five to 25 miles from railroads that may be purchased for from \$20 to \$50 an acre, is the assertion of Mark Woodruff, publicity agent of the Portland, Eugene & Eastern railway.

An attendance average of 95.07 per cent, 2877 pupils on record in Polk county, 1866 pupils neither absent nor late, are some of the items in a report issued by H. C. Seymour, county superintendent, for the month of January.

The forest service is spending \$2200 for roads during the coming summer in Baker and Grant counties, within the Whitman national forest. The service plans to open a new and shorter road across the mountains between Sumpter and lower John Day valleys, a distance of approximately 60 miles.

Miss Mollie Towne of Phoenix, formerly deputy county clerk, has announced her candidacy for the legislature on the democratic ticket, the first woman in Oregon to seek legislative honors. Miss Towne has studied law and has been admitted to practice.

It is reported that the O.W. R. & N. company will build a cutoff on its Umatilla-Spokane line from Cold Springs siding, on the Columbia river, across the irrigated section, through the town of Hermiston, connecting with the Echo-Coyote cutoff about miles west of Hermiston.

George Stewart, Jr., representing McMinnville college, won the annual intercollegiate oratorical contest of Oregon at Albany. Lisle Hubbard, of Pacific college, took second place, and Eric Bolt, of Willamette university, was third. Stewart spoke on "The American Press and World Peace."

Plans for a federated college and religious training school will be considered this spring at the annual Oregon conferences of the United Evangelical, United Brethren and Evangelical Association denominations. The conference of the United Evangelical churches will be held at Dallas, beginning April 4.

The Anti-Saloon league of America, whose headquarters and general publishing house is in Westerville, Ohio, has determined to throw the whole power of its organization to the assistance of the Anti-Saloon league of Oregon and the other organizations co-operating with it for a dry Oregon this year.

Believing that an eight-hour law having application to farms, dairies and other agricultural pursuits would be an injustice, the Linn county Pomona grange has passed a resolution protesting against such a regulation. It is recited that such a law would be wholly impracticable to the conditions peculiar to farm industries.

To retain the services of L. J. Chapin, the agricultural expert employed during the last two years to give expert assistance to the farmers of Marion county, the promotion department of the Salem commercial club has appropriated funds for the payment of half of his annual salary. In the past this had been paid by the county court, the other half being paid by the government, but this year the county court refused to give any funds for the purpose.
