K. A. Booth, the Republican Senatorial candidate, who will undoubtedly be the only formidable candidate against Senator Chamberlain, has been in our city and has met some of our people. A rather small crowd gathered here at the Commercial Club rooms on Wednesday evening, Mr. Booth, who is a millionaire lumberman is certainly a very fine man, at least, he so impressed those who heard him. His address was very entertaining. It reminded us in many respects of a good old time democratic speech, and we could not help but think, as we heard him talk, that many of the things he was proclaiming for were things that the Democratic party has been advocating for years and we were through the excellent leadership of President Wilson making and endeavoring to make into laws for this country.

Mr. Booth expressed from the Democratic side enough to criticize the tariff reform policy of the present administration, and we have no doubt that an inward ripple of good humor spread over many of those present as he very intelligently scolded Tillamook sheep for selling for 10 per pound. In regarding free trade for most wool shirts through the Panama Canal, Mr. Booth was very consistent with Mr. Chamberlain as Mr. Chamberlain is the most radical free trade man in congress.

There seems to be no great difference, so far as we have been able to see up to the present, in what Mr. Chamberlain stands for and what Mr. Booth stands for, except in regard to the tariff, and the tariff law lately enacted seems to be adjusting itself so nicely to the needs of the people, as a whole, that Senator Chamberlain has certainly the best of the argument along that line.

In summing up the senatorial situation we can come to but one conclusion and that is to the effect that it is not a good policy to exchange senatorial timber, especially when the present incumbent has made good.

The office of United States Senator is a pretty big job and Senator Chamberlain has proven himself big enough for the position. In the four years he has been senator he has acquired an experience and prestige that will be of unestimable value to Oregon in the future, and what is more he belongs to the party that is destined to remain in power for some time, for as Senator LaFollette who voted for the present tariff law, said: "The present administration has made a record unsurpassed for genuine constructive legislation." The people of the country have been educated to a point where they are now able to appreciate the truth as set forth by Senator LaFollette, and we do not believe they can be flimflammed or fooled into voting into power a party that has been long on promises and mighty short when it came to the fulfillment of those promises.

Senator Chamberlain will have more prestige in congress and will therefore be in a position to do more for Oregon than Mr. Booth because of the fact that he belongs to the party that is in power and will be in power for some time to come.

By the way some of our standpat friends express themselves these days one would think that our tariff laws should be made for the benefit of the producer alone, and that the consumer has no alternative but to pay the price or go without. The last issue of the Headlight contained several news items selling of large shipments of dairy and other products from Europe to some of our large cities on the Atlantic seaboard. The Headlight and other papers of its stripe condemn a tariff law that allows this sort of thing, regardless of the fact that many poor people of the large eastern seaboard cities are now able to buy some of the ordinary commodities of life at a reasonable price; regardless of the fact that many who were previously going hungry are now being fed. We know this is a very "sad" state of affairs, looking at the matter from a strictly selfish dollars and cents standpoint, but the people wanted this sort of thing, they voted for it, and now they have got it. At least that is the situation in the East.

In the West and in Oregon especially conditions are different for, regardless of the reduction of the tariff, prices have remained about the same, with

the exception of cheese and wool which are now the highest they have ever been. It might be interesting to note some of Portland's jobbing prices for Oregon commodities: Chickens 17 1/2 to 18; butter 22 to 23; eggs 19 to 20; cheese 21 to 22. Any far minded man will tell you that the producer has nothing to kick about in regard to the above prices. The question arises here, however: Why is it that the West is not effected by the new tariff law as is the East? There is one principal reason: Our great increase in immigration accompanied by our heavy development works caused by the unprecedented rapid growth of a new country, has created a great local demand for all food products. And the question may well be asked: Where would we be in regard to food supply if it were not for the fact that we are getting some relief through the importation of certain foreign products. Take beef for instance: beef has been so high that many small butchers have been forced out of business on the coast, ask your local butcher about it. The importation of foreign beef has been a Godsend to this country, and it is the only means whereby the price of meat can be kept any where within the reach of the laboring man.

Regardless of the wail of the calamity howler, Oregon has not suffered, but in reality has benefited by the reduction of the tariff.


