## LOOKS BAD FOR CALAMITY

From the Johnstown Democrat:

The American Wool and Cotton Reporter is not a free trade organ. It is not subsidized by the Wilson administration. It is in no wise allied with Underwood and Simmons. It is simply the recognized and duly accredited spokesman for the great textile industry. And here is its testimony regarding the conditions in that industry under a Democratic low tariff:

"Nearly three months have elapsed since the tariff reduction on manufactured goods became effective, and the textile business in general is much better than many would have us believe. It may be safely stated that the turning point has been passed and the outlook for the future has much of promise. Instead of the condition of acute depression foretold by those who could see only complete disruption of the industry, the great majority of our mills are operating full time with a full complement of help. In several textile centers there is a greater apprehension of a scarcity of help as the spring season comes on than anxiety as to lack of orders.

"The improvement in conditions in the woolen and worsted industries is possibly more evident than in the cotton division of textiles. The overcoating situation, when in the early weeks of the season was looked upon with a feeling of apprehension by both dealer and manufacturer, has taken a complete turn, thanks to favorable weather conditions, and the abnormally large stocks of goods and garments have been so radically reduced that a considerable volume of orders for fabrics has been forwarded to the mills.

"We are inclined to take a rather optimistic view of the outlook for a variety of reasons, not the least of which is the spirit of confidence so strongly manifested by practically all of our manufacturers and business men. Labor is more fully employed, many mills and shops which were running but part time are increasing their forces, and in several instances are operating double time. Another cause for optimism is the frequency with which items relative to increase in mill buildings or equipment appear."

We feel that the American Wool and Cotton Reporter has not been keeping in proper touch with Senator Penrose and the organs of calamity. The senator and the organs know—or they say—that the textile industry is "prostrate." They insist that panic conditions even now prevail. They declare in season and out of season that factories have been closed and that hundreds of thousands of American toilers have been turned out upon the cold charity of the world. Of this the Wool and Cotton Reporter seems strangely unaware.

In fact it professes optimism as it looks abroad over its special field. "Labor is more fully employed," it says, "many mills and shops which were running but part time and increasing their forces are in several instances are operating double time."

Just think of that. Not merely increasing their forces, but operating double time! And under "free trade" and right in the very faces of Penrose and Fordney and Mann and other howlers of calamity. The Wool and Cotton Reporter surely lacks in feeling or it would never thus exploit its optimism


