Feeney & Bremer Co. Completes Big Job

Tillamook Firm Has Just Finished Building Large Revolving Pile Driver For Government.

The Feeney Bremer Co., of this city has just completed for the government a large revolving pile driver to be used by the government on the Nehalem jetty work. The contract for this work was secured early in the year in competition with several Portland firms.

The largest single casting of the job weighs 5000 pounds, and the largest gear measures 14 feet 6 inches in diameter.

The revolving pile driver was shipped to Nehalem on Monday and will be put in place at once for service on the government work.

The Feeney & Bremer Co. is now engaged in building the large wave motion machine for the natatorium at Bayocean. Mr. Steinbach is now at Bayocean looking after a part of the work there.

The main building and tank will be 200 feet long and 80 feet wide, and the water used therein will be pumped from the ocean and kept at the proper temperature for bathing purposes. The wave motion machine which is a large piece of machinery will be used to produce a motion of the water similar to the waves of the ocean. This new innovation promises to be very popular.

PORTLAND LETTER.

Portland, Ore., April 7, 1914. (Special)—Of great interest and importance to the entire Columbia Basin is the prediction made recently by Major J. J. Morrow, engineer in charge of this district, that river steamers would be passed through the Celilo Canal before the first of next January. The past month of March was notable in that more actual progress was made on the canal than in any other single month. From end to end the great ditch is the scene of ceaseless and effective activity. Locks are being constructed, gates installed, the bottom of the canal is being floored with steel bars over which is poured thousands of tons of concrete, the sloping sides are being ripped up in one place with reinforced concrete, in another with rubble masonry and in still another with great blocks of lava rock, according to the character of the backing material.

At the head of Five Mile Rapids a little band of men is at work boring holes into the rocky walls of the gorge, carefully examining the material brought up by the drills and carefully recording their observations. These men are the pioneers sent out by the states of Washington and Oregon to determine the feasibility of constructing a great dam across the river at this point for the purpose of installing the most powerful hydro-electric plant west of Niagara Falls. The river is only about 200 feet wide at the head of the rapids, but the depth nearly equals the width.

Preparations are practically completed for the convention of the Columbia and Snake River Waterways association to be held at the Portland Commercial Club April 13-14. Everyone interested in the success of this movement is invited to attend this meeting at which it is proposed to crystallize into actual constructive work the theories, plans and dreams of the men who have for months been giving up their time to the project. Rates of one and one-third fares for the round trip have been granted by all the roads of the Northwest.

TILLAMOOK'S POPULAR AUTO MAIL STAGE.

Harris and Vidito are now running their mail stage route between Tillamook and Cloverdale. The use of the auto makes the trip to Cloverdale a comparatively easy one with inconveniences placed at a minimum.

The auto stage leaves Tillamook immediately after the 4:30 P. M., Portland Tillamook train arrives and leaves Cloverdale for Tillamook at 8:15 A. M., giving the traveling public the very best of accommodations.

The regular rates have been cut almost in half for the summer travel and areas follows.

Yellow Fir mill 50c, round trip 75c.
Hemlock 75c, round trip \$1.25.
Beaver \$1.00, round trip \$1.50.
Hebo \$1.25, round trip \$2.00.
Cloverdale \$1.50, round trip \$2.50.

During the favorable season of the year, when the roads are at their best the auto stage is forced to compete with much outside competition in the shape of all kinds of passenger carrying autos which are taken off the run as soon as the roads begin to get bad. This state of affairs is somewhat annoying to the proprietors of the mail stage, who at times are called upon to rub their auto at a loss when the roads are bad. There have been times during which Harris and Vidito have run their auto when they knew it would be a detriment to their machine and a financial loss otherwise, just to accommodate the public. For this reason they feel that now when conditions are more favorable they should receive at least a reasonable amount of consideration from the public that they have endeavored to accommodate. The owners of the auto stage are here to stay winter and summer. They pay taxes and help to support the county in many ways, and should in turn receive the consideration that is due them.

W. W. WILEY DEAD.

A message was received here on Sunday morning to the effect that W. W. Wiley, formerly of this city, had died at La Mesa, Cal., that morning at one o'clock. The immediate cause of his death was heart trouble. Mr. Wiley went to California about eighteen months ago for the benefit of his health, as he had been ill with tuberculosis. He was greatly benefitted by the change of climate and was thought to be nearly recovered from the disease as he was able to be up and about and seemed to be in very good health until a short time before his death.

The deceased leaves a wife and four children. Mrs. Wiley is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. C. N. Drew of this city and was born and raised here.

Mr. Wiley held the office of County Superintendent of the schools of this county a few years ago and was well known and highly respected here. He was a member of the M. E. Church and also belonged to the Masonic order. Mrs. Wiley and the children have the sympathy of many friends in this hour of bereavement.

It is expected that the remains left La Mesa at noon today accompanied by Mrs. Wiley and will be brought to Beaverton, Or., for interment.

Mrs. C. N. Drew and daughter Lelia will leave here Friday for Beaverton where they will meet the funeral party.

Tillamook to be Great Terminal

St. Paul Dispatch Says Hill Is Planning Great Things for Tillamook Bay. Work on Big Scale Planned.

St. Paul, Minn., April 6.—That harbor improvements at Tillamook, Ore., which it is proposed to make a rival to San Francisco, as a shipping point, will be built along lines formulated by ex-President John F. Stevens of the North Bank road and the Hill lines in Oregon, was announced here today by the Hill interests.

It was explained that the purpose is to outdo by sea and rail the fastest time now made along the coast and from the coast to the interior.

The plans call for the expenditure of many millions of dollars. Two ships for the coastwise service, it was stated, are now being built at Philadelphia.

The government, Hill sources were authority for saying, will spend \$2,000,000 in dredging Tillamook harbor, and it was understood that it was to secure federal aid in opening this harbor that James J. Hill's recent trips to Washington were undertaken.

United Railways from Portland to Tillamook is to be one of the links in the system. It is said the line will tunnel the mountains between Tillamook and Hillsboro. The rail and water line is to make trip from San Francisco to Portland in 24 hours.

A NEW DEFINITION FOR ANARCHIST.

A rather amusing incident took place before Judge Holmes at a session of the Circuit Court on Monday. A foreigner who was seeking his naturalization papers was being questioned by the judge. The judge asked the prospective citizen if he knew what an anarchist was, whereupon the citizen was replied, stating that an anarchist was a Republican. By this time the judge realized that an interpreter was needed and one was called with the result that matters soon assumed the normal again.

CITY COUNCIL MEETS IN REGULAR SESSION

The city council met in regular session on Monday evening with the following officers present: Mayor Beals, Councilmen Brodhead, Edmunds, Lamb, Melchior and Keldson; Recorder Hays and Marshal Meyers.

The regular bills were allowed. The street committees report on sanitary sewer was continued.

The new electric light was ordered on the corner of Fourth and Park streets and the light on Eighth and Park was ordered moved to Seventh and Park.

Some of the property owners of Maple Grove Addition having failed to pay for their public improvements under Hancock Bonding act, the council instructed Attorney Botts to proceed to collect.

The order requiring a cement walk on Fourth Avenue West and the opening of Tenth street to Sixth Ave. East was continued.

The ordinances relating to franchises, the use of cigarettes by boys, and fire hazard restrictions were laid over until another meeting.

The matter of a garbage dump and a clean-up day for Tillamook was referred to a committee.

F. J. Miller of the state railroad commission addressed the council and gave an instructive talk as to the power of the commission in regard to municipal affairs and pointed out to some extent the ability of the commission to assist the city in handling certain matters.

CIRCUIT COURT IN SESSION

The April term of the Circuit Court convened on Monday, with Judge Holmes presiding. The first cases to be taken up were the naturalization cases.
