We received this week, a booklet, printed at the Cloverdale Courier plant, which deals with affairs at Cloverdale and other points of interest in the south end of the county. The pamphlet is well edited and well printed and compares very favorably with the work done in other plants of the state. Editor Taylor is to be commended for the fine work he has done on this book which contains some 18 pages of matter including numerous appropriate scenes.

This issue of the Herald contains two interviews which are indeed of a very optimistic nature. One of the interviews relates to the wool industry and the other to the cheese industry of the state. The interview in regard to the cheese industry comes from a man who is known by almost everyone in the county and is authority on matters pertaining to our chief industry. We are pleased to publish such cheerful news in regard to the cheese industry because of the fact that there seems to be an influence, backed by the Headlight, to discredit the cheese market. Whether this is done at the instigation of outside buyers or for political reasons is a question in the minds of some. However, it is a fact that the middle men who handle cheese would like nothing better than what they have got, viz: A newspaper at the seat of production which continually keeps up a calamity howl as to future prices for cheese, which procedure will in time prepare the minds of some of the ranchers so that they will be satisfied to take any old price for their cheese, and this is what the buyers want. The question naturally arises: What kind of a game has Baker tied himself up to now? In the face of conditions as they actually are there is absolutely no reason whatever for the howl of calamity that the Headlight is continually sending forth, which must, if it has any influence whatever, hurt the county. The Headlight's policy can certainly never do the county any good.

LIQUOR TRAFFIC RECEIVES ANOTHER FALL

Topeka, Kan., April 11.—The Webb-Kenyon bill, passed by congress, which gives the states control over liquor shipments, met the favor today of the Kansas Supreme Court. As a result of the decision Kansas will take charge of all liquor shipped into the state.

The case was that of a St. Louis brewing company appealing from a decision of the District Court in Cherokee County. The St. Louis company shipped a carload of beer to Corona, Kan. State officials confiscated it under the Webb law and the company sought the return of the beer or reimbursement.

"Without this law no state has any more control over liquor than it has over the shipment of wheat and corn," said Justice R. A. Burch, who wrote the opinion.

"We believe that the liquor traffic can be made subject to the same regulation as obscene literature and white slavery and that Congress has sufficient power to regulate the shipments

of liquor as it has to prohibit transportation of white slaves."

[Editor's Note: The successful operation of the Webb-Kenyon law means thousands of additional votes for the Prohibition cause in this state. The excuse that has often been made, viz: That there is no use in voting the state dry as long as liquor can be shipped indiscriminately in from wet states, has lost its force of argument. The signs of the times tell us that the liquor business is doomed. However, the Prohibition forces in Oregon are liable to make the mistake of being over confident this fall and for that reason we would urge every person who is interested in the prohibition cause to get out and register, and see to it that others who are inclined towards the dry side do likewise. If Oregon is to be voted dry this fall every dry vote in the state must be polled.]

TILLAMOOK MAN INTERVIEW—ED ON CHEESE SITUATION

From Journal: Contrary to former expectations and belief of the general trade, the output of cheese at Tillamook to date this season is showing an increase over the corresponding period a year ago. Not only is the output somewhat greater but the prices being received by makers are the best ever known as this period of the season.

Charles Ray the veteran cheese manufacturer of Tillamook was in the city today and stated that it was a mistake that Tillamook was not making as much cheese as a year ago.

"The output of cheese in the Tillamook section this season," says Mr. Ray, "is showing a liberal increase over a year ago. This is due to two causes—the greater number of cows in that section as well as the better condition of the grass."

"The price at this time is exceptionally good and Tillamook interests are naturally much pleased. We expect, quite naturally, that values will be shaded within the next few days but we look for a good market all along."
