Last year Tillamook County spent a large sum in getting out some special advertising matter. This matter was perfectly useless as very particular. It was sent promiscuously through the east with the result that the Herald, the Headlight and other county papers have since received a large number of demands for the copies and short term subscriptions. Interested persons have been looking for the local papers to see if the matter mentioned in the papers is in harmony with the advertising matter sent out. What would a prospective advertiser think of our county after reading some of the contents of the Headlight, especially our fine family worth three and four hundred dollars per acre have been compared favorably with the sections and twenty dollar per acre lands of Douglas Co., where our real estate dealers have been compared to a herd of flies, and where in the markets of our products are depreciated and a general tone of pessimism prevails. The county, the different commercial houses of the county and our real estate men have sent out thousands of dollars worth of advertising matter during the past two years, which has been thoroughly readable in every way, only to find that now when we had about to get results that this large expenditure is all a waste of time to some extent by falsehoods, indifference and unworkable articles published in the Headlight. We have it on good authority that real estate who have concluded leaving their money in Tillamook County on long time loans have been discouraged from investing here because of the cry of "inflated land values," that originated in the mind of the Headlight's editor.

Mr. Baker is endeavoring to give a false impression in regard to the present prosperous condition of Tillamook county, thinking that he will make votes for his friends, Mr. Booth, senatorial candidate, and Mr. Hawley, congressional candidate, having in view, the white, a most office. However, we do not think the voters of the county will stand for such a procedure. When a man will publish falsehoods, and endeavor to depreciate real estate values, and otherwise injure the county just to spite someone and make votes for his political candidates, he should be made to realize the consequences which his acts deserve.

The Headlight's tactics are a detriment, not only to farm values, but they are a detriment to every business house in town, as they breed a feeling of uneasiness and uncertainty that cause people to be unduly close in all matters, injuring to a certain extent the natural development of the county.

ONE FLYTRAP IN EACH BARNYARD

University of Oregon, Eugene, April 21. Prizes not for the greatest number of flies, but for the greatest degree of flylessness, should be given in Oregon campaigns, according to Dr. Clinton F. Hodge, professor of social biology in the state University. Dr. Hodge is spending time this week in Albany and Astoria advising fly campaigns.

"It is too early to see what results the numerous campaigns will get, but the work is going ahead with vigor," said Dr. Hodge. "One flytrap in each barnyard" should be the motto of towns where stables are permitted inside the city limits. There is no necessity of having more than that for flies will go as readily into one trap as into a dozen. Each back-yard should also have a trap. Extermination of flies should not be made a burdensome matter.

"We learned a lesson from the example of Eugene last year. Eugene was flyless to a great extent until early August. Then the fight was suspended largely and by county fair time the pests were thick again. Eugene this year will keep up the fight right through."

Dr. Schaefer, head of the state University Extension division, said:

"This is a year of learning how. Absolute flylessness is not likely to be attained during 1914 but many towns will see a great lessening of flies. By August of 1915 there will be communities in Oregon where the insect will be almost a novelty."
