Our people will be pleased to know that the U. S. Bureau of Fisheries will make a survey of the fishing grounds off the Tillamook County coast this year, with a view of ascertaining just what our deep sea fisheries contain. There are many indications that rich halibut banks lay off our coast, and as soon as they can be located and thoroughly investigated, capital and industry will no doubt at once make its influence felt, and another industry will be established for our benefit.

Really the criticism of the proposed settlement between the United States and Colombia, because in it the former expresses "sincere regret" at the unpleasantness between the two countries over Panama canal matters, is a bit of finical carping. It is no more than President Roosevelt himself said when the republic of Panama was recognized and the canal zone taken over. In the first memorandum sent to Colombia by President Roosevelt after the incident, occurred this sentence: "The government and the people of the United States sincerely regret the occurrence of events that, in any manner, may have changed the long and sincere friendship which existed for almost a century between Colombia and the United States." If the expression of "regret" by President Wilson's administration is an apology on our part, how about Mr. Roosevelt's own words?

This month is a red-letter one to all the sons of Norway, the world over. The occasion is the centennial celebration of Norway's independence of Denmark, together with the observance of the hundredth year of peace among the Scandinavian countries. There are more Norwegians in the United States than in any other country outside of Norway itself. The Norwegian-Americans are fully alive to the event. Thousands of them, in chartered steamers, will cross the ocean, with their hands and choruses, ready to greet the exhibition which, opening at Christiania May 15, will show the progress of the mother country; to demonstrate, in a pavilion of their own, the life they lead in the land of their adoption; to present on behalf of the state of North Dakota, a statue of Abraham Lincoln to the city of Christiania; to celebrate the Fourth of July in approved latter-day American fashion and to participate in a long series of banquets, receptions and other ceremonial observances. And it is not likely to make them any the less loyal citizens of the country of their adoption, to thus show their interest in the land of their nativity.

The following communication recently received by Mrs. W. M. Edwards, from her brother Jos Atkinson, who is serving in Uncle Sam's navy in the far east:

U. S. S. Piscataqua,  
Olongapo, P. I.  
Mar. 31 1914.

Dear Sister:

Will try and answer your letter I got a few days ago.

We are still laid up but hope to get away from here Saturday, our repairs are all done now but cleaning up and that is almost finished and we have the finest looking boat on the station. Everything is tip top all the bright work shines like gold and all the sides have been chipped and new paint put on and every thing inside is white enamel and all the wood work is finished in clear varnish. She looks more like a private yacht than a tug. We expect to go to Manila for a few days soon as we can get out of here, but don't know for sure what we are going to do after that. The talk now is Hong Kong and we are all hoping it is true for we have been in one place long enough for one time. There is not very much doing here any more most of the ships have gone north and the marines were nearly all sent to Guam.

Three of us were in Subic last Saturday and Sunday and had a pretty good time. We had all the fried chicken we could get away with. One good thing about this country a person can get young chickens and fresh vegetables any time of the year, and it is always ice cream season. We have ice cream on the ship nearly every day when anyone will turn the freezer.

We have one man in the hospital with appendicitis but he will be back in a

few days, it only takes about three days after they operate on them till they are ready to go to work again.

They have schools started on nearly all the ships in the navy now. We are expecting to get one any time, but have been lucky enough to miss it so far. They have about the same thing as a public school but only have one and one-half hours a day and all hands have to go but it will probably fall through in a short time. It sure is making a lot of men sore at the navy and will keep a great many of them from coming back, again but I don't think it will make any difference with my shipping over.

Complete Nehalem. Wheeler and Mohler vote not in. However, it is reported that Thompson received 40 majority at Mohler while Sappington received over a hundred majority at Nehalem and Wheeler, which means that the Sappington-Thompson race is very close. Owens vote will be increased in both the north and south ends.

The vote for Governor in both the republican and democratic primaries is reported to be very close, with result in doubt. Mosier and Withycombe leading the republican candidates, and Bennett, Smith and Manning leading the Democratic candidates.
