**Harbor Improve-
 ments Under Way**

**Geibisch & Joplin Have Large Force
 at Work. Much Preparatory Work
 Being Done**

On the third day of March the Gei-
 bisch & Joplin Contracting Company
 began the work of preparing for the
 construction of the north Jetty at the
 Tillamook Bay Bar. Since then a tre-
 mendous amount of work has been
 done. Office rooms, bunk and eating
 houses were first erected after which
 the construction of a railroad was be-
 gun and the work of removing a large
 amount of dirt from the rock quarry
 undertaken.

About three quarters of a mile of
 railroad is being built into the J. C.
 Bewley quarry on the Miami, starting
 from the P. R. & N. track, near the
 Barry quarry east of Garibaldi; and
 about a half mile of railroad is being
 constructed from the P. R. & N.
 across the beach to a point where the
 jetty begins. A few piling have been
 driven and work has been started on
 the jetty, but it is not likely that
 much jetty construction work will be
 done until the railroad is completed
 and rock is available.

Some sixty men are at present en-
 gaged in removing dirt and drilling at
 the quarry and it will not be many
 days before a heavy blast will be dis-
 charged.

Geibisch & Joplin have built a tem-
 porary plank road around the quarry
 to take place of the county road which
 they are forced to use, and we under-
 stand that they will soon begin the con-
 struction of a permanent graded and
 gravelled road three quarters of a mile
 long and turn it over to the county for
 the use of the county road which they
 are now monopolizing.

S. L. Woodward, who has charge of
 the office work at the quarry, showed
 us about the buildings, which are con-
 structed and arranged with a view to
 the health and comfort of the men.
 The company must have a hundred or
 more men employed in all the depart-
 ments of the work at present.

A large force of men are now en-
 gaged at the Barry quarry which is
 furnishing rock for the Nehalem jetty.
 Tillamook County's rock quarry are
 now beginning to be a source of con-
 siderable income and it is indeed for-
 tunate that there should be so much
 valuable rock so near to the point
 where it is most needed.

The editor of the Herald in company
 with J. C. Bewley and J. H. Perkins
 made the trip to the rock quarry and
 the jetty site. We must say that the
 boys behaved nicely during the trip,
 never once attempting to take advan-
 tage of some of the alurements at
 Garibaldi.

NOMINEES CHOSEN
AT STATE PRIMARIES

Withycombe Heads Republican
Ticket and Dr. Smith Will
Lead Democrats.

Portland—Dr. Withycombe, repu-
 blican nominee for governor, owes his
 nomination to counties outside of
 Multnomah. In Multnomah county,
 Moser polled strongest of all, but other
 portions of the state flocked to the
 Withycombe banner, and cut down,
 then passed his lead.

While on the republican ticket, Dr.
 Withycombe carried a majority of the
 counties, each of the leading candi-
 dates was favored with one or more.

Umatilla, the former home county of
 Dr. Smith, the democratic nominee for
 governor, and Wasco, the home of
 Judge Bennett, who ran second, both
 gave handsome majorities for their
 candidates. The other counties
 throughout the state divided between
 the two.

Although George M. Brown lost
 Multnomah county to Frank S. Grant
 by approximately 4000, the outside
 vote more than offset Mr. Grant's gain
 and Mr. Brown is nominated by a
 plurality of 4500 to 5000. William P.
 Lord is third and J. J. Johnson fourth.

Progressives Select Gill for Governor.
 With but a few precincts uncounted,
 the result of the contest over the pro-
 gressive nomination for governor
 shows 780 votes for F. M. Gill and 468
 for McMahan. The defeat of the lat-
 ter has caused general surprise, as it
 was believed that he would capture
 the gubernatorial nomination without
 difficulty.

Sanfield Macdonald received the
 progressive nomination for commis-
 sioner of labor, 250 voters having
 written in his name for this position.
 The vote cast for other names appear-
 ing on the ballot for this nomination
 was as follows: M. E. Miller, 15; O. P.
 Hoff, 18; J. A. Madson, 49; Fred S.
 Bynon, 54.

Supreme Court Race Close.
 For the four nominations to the su-
 preme bench, Justices Bean and Mc-
 Bride and Harris have substantial
 leads over all others. For the other
 place the contest is close between
 Judge McNary and Judge Benson.
 On the democratic ticket two candi-
 dates for the supreme bench were
 named without opposition. They are
 William Galloway, Judge of the Cur-
 rent Court in Marion county and Judge
 William R. Ramsey, now on the su-
 preme bench.

Brief News of the Week

Shriners will hold their next annual
 national meeting at Seattle, Wash.,
 July 15, 1915. Dr. Frederick R. Smith
 of Rochester, N. Y., has been elected
 imperial potentate.

Postmaster General Burleson, dur-
 ing the 14 months he has been in of-
 fice, has appointed 23,317 postmasters
 of which number 5171 were of the
 presidential grade.

Ogle county, Illinois, residents told
 the public utilities commission they
 preferred to have the present phone
 system to the new plan which would
 prevent them from listening to neigh-
 borhood gossip by "cutting in."

The board of directors of the North
 Pacific Fruit Distributors have ordered
 that headquarters for handling all
 fruits be opened immediately at Port-
 land, with Wilmer Sieg, of Hood River
 as sales manager.

It is expected that Harry A. Wheel-
 er, of Chicago, will decline to accept
 the position as one of the new federal
 reserve board. Nominations of all five
 members are expected to be sent to
 the senate by the president this week.

Sheriff Smith of Cleveland sold at
 public auction \$70,000 worth more of
 land on Euclid Heights owned by Pat-
 rick Calhoun, traction magnate of
 New York and San Francisco, to sat-
 isfy a mortgage of \$1,642,000.

Water-borne freight began passing
 through the Panama canal Monday,
 when five barges carrying about 2100
 tons of miscellaneous cargo were tow-
 ed from Balboa, at the Pacific end,
 to Cristobal, at the Atlantic end of the
 canal.

The one hundred and twenty-sixth
 general assembly of the Presbyterian
 church in the United States of Ameri-
 ca, commonly known as the Presby-
 terian church, North, was opened
 Thursday in Chicago. On the same
 day the general assembly of the
 Southern Presbyterians met in Kan-
 sas City and that of the Reformed
 Presbyterians in Cincinnati.
