**COUNCIL PROCEEDINGS.**

Tillamook, Oregon, May 25, 1914.  
Pursuant to an order of adjournment made and entered on May 18, 1914, the Common Council of Tillamook City, Oregon, met in regular session this date at 8 o'clock p. m., when the following members were present: Hon. F. R. Beals, Mayor; Councilmen, S. A. Broadhead, G. A. Edmunds, John Keldson, G. B. Lamb, M. Melchior, H. T. Botta, City Atty.; N. J. Meyers, City Marshal and R. B. Hay, Recorder. Whereupon the following proceedings were had to-wit:  
Ordinance 274, entitled, "An Ordinance to provide for licensing carriers of passengers or freight for hire in Tillamook City, and declaring an emergency," was read for the first time in open council at 8:03 o'clock p. m., and on motion duly made and carried was read for the second time by title at 8:04 o'clock p. m. Upon motion duly made and carried by the following vote, S. A. Broadhead aye, G. A. Edmunds aye, J. Keldson aye, G. B. Lamb aye, M. Melchior aye. Total ayes 5, nos 0. Ordinance 274 was read for the third time in open council, on this date of its introduction, at 8:07 o'clock p. m. Being then before the Council upon the question, "Shall the ordinance pass?" the vote resulted as follows: S. A. Broadhead aye, G. A. Edmunds aye, J. Keldson aye, G. B. Lamb aye, M. Melchior aye. Total ayes 5, nos 0, absent 0, whereupon Ordinance 274 was declared duly passed.  
Ordinance 275, entitled, "An Ordinance providing for the licensing and taxing all dogs in Tillamook City, Oregon, and declaring an emergency," was read in open Council for the first time at 8:10 o'clock p. m. and on proper motion was read for the second time by title at 8:16 o'clock p. m. and upon motion duly made and carried by the following vote: S. A. Broadhead aye, G. A. Edmunds aye, J. Keldson aye, G. B. Lamb aye, M. Melchior aye. Total ayes 5, nos 0, absent 0. Ordinance 275 was read in open council for the third time, on this date of its introduction, whereupon being before the Council upon the question, "Shall the ordinance pass?" The vote resulted as follows: S. A. Broadhead aye, G. A. Edmunds aye, J. Keldson aye, G. B. Lamb aye, M. Melchior aye. Total ayes 5, nos 0, absent 0, whereupon Ordinance 275 was declared duly passed.

The following resolution was duly adopted. "Resolved that all special street improvement funds be combined into one fund known as the Bonded Street Improvement Fund, and the Treasurer of Tillamook City is hereby instructed to transfer all special bonded street improvement funds into the said one fund."

Ord. entitled, "An Ordinance giving and granting to F. D. Small and D. C. Urie, their successors and assigns, a franchise and rights to erect, maintain, use and remove poles, wires, cables, ducts, appliances and apparatus for conducting and using electricity, in, under and upon all streets, alleys, roads and ways in Tillamook City, Tillamook County, Oregon, within the limits and boundaries of said City as said City now is or hereafter may be bounded and constituted and have its limits, and to supply electric energy to the people and inhabitants of Tillamook City and to the public and to charge and collect tolls therefor," was read in open council for the first time at 9 o'clock P. M. and upon motion duly made and carried was read for the first time by title at 9:18 o'clock P. M. Whereupon on motion duly made and carried the ordinance was continued until the next regular meeting, June 1, 1914.

The street committee was ordered to investigate the location of a light pole in front of the mill on 2nd Avenue East and to have the Light Co. move it if in their estimation it was necessary.

Upon motion duly made and carried the police was instructed to notify the Mill Company to remove the pile of lumber from the sidewalk by the side of shack.

The Ways and Means Committee was instructed to find out just what the Fire Department desired and to report at the next regular meeting.

Thereupon council adjourned.

**SEEK AID OF POULTRYMEN.**

Oregon Agricultural College, Corvallis, Ore., May—Farmers and other poultry raisers of Oregon who have suffered loss in young chicks are asked to co-operate with the department of Bacteriology, Oregon Agricultural College, in ascertaining the cause and methods of control of the disease. They can assist themselves as well as confer a favor on the department by taking the chick as soon as possible after death, enclosing it in a water-tight can, packing it in ice and sawdust in a small box, and sending it parcel post to the department of Bacteriology, O. A. C., Corvallis, Oregon. Oregon is the second state in the Union to carry on this work and G. D. Horton, who is conducting the experiments, has had the benefit of three years' experimental work in the first state to undertake it, Connecticut, at Storrs Station. In inviting co-operation Mr. Horton says:

"The question of the loss of young chicks at this season of the year is one of vital importance to poultrymen. It has been estimated that at least ten per cent of all the chicks that are lost die as a result of white diarrhoea, a condition brought about by a specific germ or organism called 'Bpollarum.' The action of this organism is as follows: the mature hen having acquired the germs transmits them through her eggs to the young chicks. That is, the germs after gaining entrance into the hen's body lodge themselves within some of the ova or undeveloped eggs and later, when these germ laden eggs are hatched the young chick emerging from them are infected before leaving the shell. These chicks may live for a period of weeks during which time they are a source of danger to the healthier chicks because their droppings contain deadly germs which the healthier chicks may pick up. Complete isolation of the infected chicks and the free use of sour milk will lessen, in a large measure, the mortality.

"In order to determine accurately whether or not the loss of the chicks is due to the presence of the white diarrhoea germs and thereby gain some idea as to the condition of the health of the present stock, the Bacteriological department will make an examination, free, of the dead chicks provided the chicks are sent direct to the department of Bacteriology just as soon as they die. Our aim is to control and eventually wipe out this unnecessary 'evil' in this state. Co-operation upon the part of the poultry raisers is not only desired but necessary for the success of this undertaking. Further information may be obtained by addressing the department of Bacteriology, Oregon Agricultural College, Corvallis, Oregon."
