Celery Raising To Be Encouraged

Tillamook County Soil Especially Adapted For Celery Culture. Experiments Will Be Made

For some time express agent Watkins of the Wells Fargo Express Co., has interested himself in the idea of the cultivation of celery in this county. As it is now, nearly all the celery that is consumed in the Northwest is grown in Florida and is sold in Portland and Seattle at exorbitant prices. One-half a crate, containing about 26 stalks selling for \$4.25 on the Portland market. Plants can be delivered at Tillamook for 35c per hundred, which is very reasonable.

Mr. Watkins sent samples of our soils to the Agricultural College at Corvallis, and the report in regard to the same is to the effect that our soil is the very finest for the production of celery and then it seems that we have in many places the natural drainage which costs other celery raising districts considerable money to obtain.

A few experiments have been made in celery raising here but have not been very successful, for the reason that we do not get enough sunshine to develop the plant in all the stages of growth. It is thought by shipping well developed plants from the east that this obstacle can be overcome.

Mr. Watkins has sent for a shipment of celery plants which will arrive from the east sometime between the 15th and the 20th of June and those who want to secure some of them for the purpose of giving celery growing a trial, will be able to get them at a very reasonable rate.

MRS. C. E. MOWERY DEAD.

Mrs. Hanna Josephine Mowery, wife of Charles E. Mowery, died at her late residence on Tuesday afternoon, June 2nd of heart failure. She has been ailing more or less with this trouble for about five years.

Mrs. Mowery was born in Gellie, Sweden on the 28th of October, 1881. When only one year old she came to America with her parents who settled in New Haven, Conn., and in the year 1888 they came west and settled in Tillamook county, where they have since resided, and are well and favorably known as one of the pioneer families of this county. The Neilson family consists of the father and mother, four brothers and two daughters.

Hanna Josephine was married to Mr. Chas. E. Mowery on June 28th, 1905. She leaves behind a husband and three children, Jack Robert, 5 years old; Elizabeth, 7 years old; and Gladys, 2 years and 6 months old, to mourn her untimely end.

The funeral service was held at the Christian Church on Thursday at 2:30 P. M., and was conducted by Rev. D. A. MacKenzie, pastor of the Presbyterian Church.

The attendance at the church and cemetery was a tribute of respect for the deceased and her family, and an index of the love and esteem cherished towards the departed by the people of the city and county of Tillamook. The entire Neilson family and the bereaved husband desire to express their appreciation of every tribute of respect placed on the casket of their loved one by their many friends throughout the entire county.

COUNCIL PROCEEDINGS.

Tillamook, Oregon, June 1, 1914

The Common Council of Tillamook City met in regular session this date at 7:30 o'clock P. M., when were present Hon. F. R. Beals, Mayor, Councilmen S. A. Broadhead, G. A. Edmunds, J. Keldson, G. B. Lamb and M. Melchior, City Attorney H. T. Bots, Marshal N. J. Myers and Recorder R. B. Hays. Whereupon the following business was transacted to-wit:

The minutes of the last regular and adjourned meetings were read and approved.

The reports on City liens, garbage and dump construction, damages in Maple Grove arising from conflicting grades, necessary concrete sidewalk construction were ordered continued.

In regard to the demurrage claim of the P. R. & N. against the city, the City Atty. reported that he had received no answer from the interested parties as yet.

The Finance Committee was ordered to adjust the damage claims of Thayer and Goodspeed caused by the city acquiring enough property to lay a sidewalk on the North side of 1st St. east of 2nd Avenue E.

Tom Costes, E. J. Claussen, H. Crenshaw and D. W. Dwight spoke at some length as to the Fire department and it seemed from their speech that all that was necessary in order to have an active, efficient, wide awake fire company was for the officers and citizens of the city to show an interest in the boys and their work.

The city attorney was ordered to draft a speed ordinance applicable to motor vehicles and allowing a maximum speed of 12 miles an hour.

The street committee was instructed to have the necessary street repairs made.

Upon motion duly made and carried the Franchise Ordinance of F. D. Small and D. C. Uri was amended by the following insertion, to be known as subdivision 6 of Section 12, Sixth, "That the said F. D. Small and D. C. Uri, their successors and assigns, shall within the said (18) eighteen months construct a water power electric light and power system for furnishing electric light and power under the provisions of this ordinance, at a cost, in material and labor (exclusive of promotion expenses) of not less than (\$30000.00) thirty thousand dollars and shall upon request furnish evidence satisfactory to the council of the expenditure above mentioned.

Whereupon Ordinance 276 was read for the third time in open council at 9:35 o'clock P. M. June 1, 1914, and being before the council the question, "Shall the Ordinance pass?" the vote resulted as follows: S. A. Broadhead, aye, G. A. Edmunds, aye, J. Keldson, aye, G. B. Lamb, aye, M. Melchior, aye, total ayes 5, nays 0, absent 0. Whereupon Ord. No. 276 was declared duly passed.

On motion duly made and carried the following bills were allowed and warrants ordered drawn on the Treasurer for the respective amounts:

\$203.05 Tillamook Electric Light & Fuel Co., \$26.40 R. B. Hays, \$90.00 N. J. Myers, \$30.00 R. B. Hays, salaries, \$27.80 L. Hiner, street cart, \$53.75 P. Daly, labor, \$65.00 Ike Shortridge, salary.

It is ordered that a hearing of objections and remonstrances to the sewers and pavement assessment be and the same is hereby continued until the next regular meeting June 15, 1914 at 7:30 o'clock P. M.

It is further ordered that the time for receiving bids for concrete sidewalk construction be continued until the next regular meeting June 15, 1914 at 7 o'clock P. M.

Council then adjourned, on motion duly made and carried, to meet June 8, 1914, at 7:30 o'clock P. M. at the office of Mayor F. R. Beals.
