BOAT AT GARIBALDI TO TRY SEA FISHING

From Bay City Examiner:

The gasoline deep sea boat Arab, of Portland in charge of Captain Smith is anchored at Garibaldi, preparatory to making a trip of investigation of the halibut banks some time at an early date.

The boat was brought to Garibaldi at the instigation of C. M. Alexander, of that place who has been an enthusiastic booster for the fishing industry in this county, and it is Mr. Alexander, who is defraying the expenses of the initial trip. The first trip was to have been made tomorrow morning, but the unsettled appearance of the weather will postpone this until a later day. In talking to a representative of this paper Mr. Alexander stated that the boat would carry perhaps five men, and that every effort would be made to make the venture successful, and that he had great confidence in the future development of this industry in this county.

MAYOR RETURNS FRANCHISE ORDINANCE UNSIGNED

Tillamook Oregon, June 5, 1914.
To the Common Council of Tillamook City, Oregon.

Gentlemen:—I return herewith, without approval, Ordinance No. 276 entitled "An ordinance giving and granting to F. D. Small and D. C. Urie, their successors and assigns, a franchise and rights to erect, maintain, use and remove poles, wires, cables, ducts, appliances and apparatus for conducting and using electricity in, under and upon all streets, alleys, roads and ways in Tillamook City, Tillamook County, Oregon, within the boundaries of said city now is or may hereafter be bounded and constituted and have its limits, and to supply electric energy to the people and inhabitants of Tillamook City, and to the public, and to charge and collect tolls therefor.

My reason for not approving said Ordinance are as follows:

First, and I deem it important that the city's interests be safeguarded by having incorporated in said franchise Section XIII of the franchise drafted by the State Railway Commission, and adopted by the city of Mt. Angel in its franchise granted the Portland Railway Light and Power Company. The Section referred to, to read as follows:

SECTION XIII.—Said F. D. Small and D. C. Urie, their successors or assigns, shall render the service as hereby authorized, to be supplied by the best apparatus known to the science of electricity, to secure the least danger of life or property compatible with the best obtainable service, and such service shall be supplied on equal terms under like conditions, and without unjust discrimination, or without undue preference to any commercial user within the City of Tillamook; and at all times the power and right to reasonably regulate and exercise the rights and privileges of the franchise hereby granted and determined, shall be vested in the Common Council of said city, subject to the general laws of the State of Oregon.

Second, Numerous erasures and interlineations appear in this Ordinance, of no importance perhaps as affecting its validity, but an ordinance of this importance should be free from such defects.

Many Improvements Made Here Lately

Several New Residences Have Been
Constructed During the Past
Winter and Spring. Other
Improvements.

During the past few months Tillamook people and some who have lately arrived here have signified their confidence in Tillamook City by building and making other improvements here.

Tillamook City has secured new energy and capital through the coming of C. J. Edwards, late of Newberg, in our midst. Mr. Edwards has purchased an interest in the Tillamook Light and Fuel Co., and has now under way the investment of \$25,000 in new equipment for that company. A new steam turbine costing \$11,000 has been purchased. This new piece of machinery has a capacity of 500 K. W. and will develop from 800 to 1000 h. p. In order to give the reader some idea of the advantage of the new steam turbine over the present method, we will state that the new turbine will furnish 1 K. W., with 19 pounds of steam, while the present method will furnish 1 K. W., with 70 to 80 pounds of steam.

As matters develop the present system will be rebuilt throughout and put in first class shape. It is thought that possibly by August a day service will be instituted. Under the new arrangement of affairs the company will offer electricity for cooking, heating and every phase of domestic use.

Many Residences Constructed

Minich & Winters, contractors have recently completed the construction of a fine two story bungalow with seven rooms and bath and all other modern improvements. This house is plastered and very prettily papered. Keldson & Cardin did the interior and exterior decorating.

Ed McAlpin who has purchased a strip of land 100 feet long on Third street just east of the depot has moved what formerly was the Miller residence from the P. R. & N. Ry. grounds onto his property and is remodeling it. He is building six box stalls across the South end of his property and will build a large stable 100 ft. wide and 200 ft. long which will be used as a feed, sale and storage stable. He will hold regular sales here and will buy and sell horses.

Chas. Cooper, contractor, is building a nice residence of bungalow type, with 5 rooms, bath and kitchen for Mr. Shaw, east of the railway station. The

The State Federation of Labor is interesting itself on broad lines to have Oregon material used on the new State University buildings, whether the work is done by union labor or on open shop principals.

The P. E. & E. railroad will erect a station at Georgetown.

The Oregon and California land grant suit involving 2,300,000 acres has been taken on appeal to the Supreme court of the United States.

Contracts for the 1915 crop are at 16 cents.
