In the absence of Dept. Commander Upton of the Spanish American War Veterans, Rollie W. Watson was called upon for an address in behalf of the Spanish American War Veterans. During the evening the Ladies of the G. A. R. presented the G. A. R. Drum Corps and the G. A. R. Veterans each with a sum of money.

The parade which took place this morning was the finest that ever took place in the city. It was headed by the Tillamook City band after which followed Commander Taylor representing the G. A. R. and R. W. Watson representing the Spanish War Veterans.

After them followed the city officials, the drum corps of Portland, made up of old veterans. After them followed the visiting veterans; Corinth Post of Tillamook; Tillamook Drum corps; the W. R. C. and ladies of the G. A. R.; the Odd Fellows and Rebekahs. There were several nice floats in the parade, E. T. Halton having one made up of a sail boat beautifully draped. R. F. Zachman had a fine ad of his milking machines. He had one wagon fixed up with a cow on it representing the old way of milking. The residents of Tillamook offered a royal welcome to the Grand Army of the Republic, Monday at 3:45 p.m. The Commercial Club turned out in mass with automobiles and took all delegates to the respective hotels and homes that had been opened to entertain them. The first section of the G. A. R. Special brought in 650 delegates of the G. A. R., Womens Relief Corps and ladies of the G. A. R. and more arrived later.

The town is beautifully decorated with flags, bunting, banners and colored lights for our reception. A fine band concert was given in the evening in the open by the Tillamook band.

CHEESE PRICES FIRM.

In an interview from Chas. Ray, of Cloverdale, taken from the Journal of the 9th, it is contended that we can now look for an upward tendency in the cheese market.

That the bottom price has been reached for cheese in the local market this season and that an advance may be expected within a week or morning by Charles Ray, the pioneer cheese maker of Cloverdale, Tillamook County.

"The present market for cheese," says Mr. Ray, "is about as low as the market will go this season and within two weeks at least I believe that higher prices will be forced."

There is no surplus of cheese in the Tillamook section at this time and the entire production is passing into consumption.

"The make this season is about normal, showing practically no increase over this period a year ago. This is unexpected and is due to the shortage of rainfall."

Strenuous efforts have been made by some of the big packing concerns to beat down the price of cheese in this section this season but their efforts were futile and the market price is being fully maintained generally.

A. R. Press Committee, Eva Woolworth, Louisa Kalston and Alice C. Boswell.

The matter of music was presented by Mrs. Stranahan who suggested that a knowledge of the elementary points of music ought to be included in the education of all children provide elementary instruction in the reading of music and singing during the coming school year. G. B. Lamb and E. J. Claussen were re-elected to the offices of director and clerk, respectively, without opposition.
