"The present market for cheese," says Mr. Ray, is about as low as the market will go this season and within I believe that two weeks at least higher prices will be forced.

There is no surplus of cheese in the Tillamook section at this time and the entire production is passing into consumption. "The make this season is about nor-

mal, showing practically no increase over this period a year ago. This is unexpected and is due to the shortage of rainfall."

Strenuous efforts have been made by some of the big packing concerns to beat down the price of cheese in this section this season but their efforts were futile and the market price is being fully maintained generally,
