THE FARMER MEETINGS

The Farmer meetings which were held in the county last week were on the whole quite well attended. The Cloverdale and Beaver meetings were especially well attended.

The Tillamook and Nehalem meetings were not as well attended as they might have been.

The chief topics discussed at the meetings were "Loganberries" and "Better Bulls."

W. S. Brown and W. A. Barr of the Agricultural College and J. E. Dorman of the U. S. Dairy Division, accompanied by our County Agriculturist, R. C. Jones and J. W. Palmer, Commissioner of the State Horticulture Department were the speakers.

Messrs Dorman, Barr and Jones talked on the subject of better breeding for the dairy herd and also discussed many other matters of importance to the dairy business.

An endeavor was made at all of the meetings to encourage the forming of co-operative bull associations and several signified their willingness to take hold of the proposition which is indeed an encouraging sign.

W. L. Brown's talks on Loganberry culture was instructive and was of special interest especially to the Beaver people who have formed a co-operation, and are erecting a dryer.

Mt. Angel Institution Suit

Sustained by Supreme Court

The decision of the Circuit Court, in the suit for criminal libel brought by the Benedictine Sisters of Mt. Angel, Oregon against J. E. Hosmer, editor of the Silverton Journal was sustained, yesterday by the Supreme Court. The opinion of the Supreme Court was written by Hon. Charles L. McNary, Chief Justice McBride and his associates concurring and confirming the unanimous verdict of the jury which found J. E. Hosmer "Guilty of Criminal Libel." The Benedictine Sisters of Mt. Angel are entirely vindicated, and Hosmer must pay his fine or go to jail.

Premiums Upon Babies.

Angustus, emperor of Rome, made babies a passport to office. By the Lex Papia Poppaea, passed in A. D. 9, definite preference as regards office was given to the fathers of satisfactorily large families. Such fathers were eligible for office before twenty-five. They took precedence of colleagues with no children or fewer than three and were preferred all round. The privilege was called the "jus trium liberorum" (three children privilege), but the qualifying number, three in Rome, was four in Italy, five in the provinces. The system, however, never worked well.

Only twice in 25 years has Umatilla county wool sold for prices equal to those secured by Pilot Rock growers at the public sale held there. This was the first public sealed bid sale held in Oregon this year. More than 500,000 pounds changed hands, every clip offered being sold. The prices received ranged as much as 5 1/2 cents in advance of those paid for the same clips last year.
