POST OFFICE POSITIONS OPEN

June 25, 1914.

The United States Civil Service Commission announces that an examination will be held at Tillamook, Oregon, July 25, 1914, to establish eligible registers from which selections may be made to fill a vacancy existing in the position of clerk at an entrance salary of \$800 per annum and assistant postmaster at \$880 per annum in the Tillamook, Oregon, Post Office. Attention is invited to the fact that while the entrance salary for clerk is \$800 per annum, provision is made for the promotion of qualified clerks \$100 per year after a year's satisfactory service until a maximum salary of \$1000 is reached. Men and women will be admitted to the examination. Persons who desire to compete should apply to the district secretary, U. S. Civil Service Commission, Seattle, Washington for application, and pamphlet of instructions, or they may be obtained from the Postmaster in this city next week.
