## IMPERIAL COUPLE SHOT BY STUDENT

### Archduke Francis Ferdinand and Wife of Austria Vic- tims of Assassins.

Sarajevo, Bosnia.—Archduke Fran-  
cis Ferdinand, heir to the throne of  
Austria-Hungary, and the Princess  
Hohenberg, his morganatic wife, were  
shot dead by a student in the main  
street of the Bosnian capital a short  
time after they had escaped death  
from a bomb hurled at the royal auto.

The archduke was struck full in the  
face and the princess was shot through  
the abdomen and throat. They died  
a few minutes after reaching the pal-  
ace, to which they were hurried with  
all speed.

Those responsible for the deed took  
care that it should be effective, as  
there were two assaults, the first with  
a bomb and the second with a revo-  
lver. The bomb was thrown at the  
royal automobile as it was proceeding  
to the town hall, where a reception  
was to be held. The archduke saw  
the missile hurtling through the air  
and warded it off with his arm. It  
fell outside the car and exploded,  
slightly wounding two aides-de-camp  
in a second car and half a dozen spec-  
tators.

It was on the return of the proces-  
sion that the tragedy was added to  
the long list of those that have dark-  
ened the pages of the recent history  
of the Hapsburgs. As the royal ma-  
chine rushed a prominent point in  
the route to the palace an eighth-  
grade student, Gavrilo Princip, sprang  
out of the crowd and poured a deadly  
bullet into the archduke's chest from an automatic  
revolver.

Paris.—"Jack" Johnson still holds  
the heavyweight championship of the  
world.  
In a flat battle at the Velodrome  
d'Alger here he easily defeated Frank  
Moran, of Pittsburgh, on points in a  
20-round contest.

St. Louis.—Ten deaths from the ex-  
cessive heat in 24 hours and 20 pros-  
trations was the record here.

Ship to Go East.  
Baker.—Flock masters in the vicin-  
ity of Baker are preparing to ship a  
large number of sheep within the next  
few weeks. Most of the shipments  
will be made and will consist of lambs  
and wethers.

## MELLEN IS INDICTED; BIG PLOT ALLEGED

Cambridge, Mass.—Eighteen per-  
sons, including Charles E. Mellen, for-  
mer president of the New York, New  
Haven & Hartford and the Boston &  
Maine Railroad Company, Frederick  
C. Moseley, of F. S. Moseley & Co.,  
Boston brokers, and the investment  
committee of two savings banks of  
this city, were indicted by the Middle-  
sex county grand jury on various  
charges in connection with the finan-  
ces of the Hampden Railroad from  
Bondsville to Springfield.

The indictments against Mellen,  
Moseley and Gillett allege conspiracy  
to induce the investment committee of  
the two banks to lend a total of \$45,  
000 to the corporation.

Denials that there was any con-  
spiracy on their part in the purchase  
of the Hampden notes were made by  
Gustavus Gosper, of the board of  
East Cambridge Savings Bank, and  
Edward R. Cogswell, of the invest-  
ment committee of the Cambridge  
Savings Bank.

### Wheat Lowest Price in Eleven Years.

Chicago.—Wheat prices are the low-  
est since 1903. There has been a  
break of 12 cents within five weeks.  
For the first time in recent years  
the United States is leading the world  
in making low prices for wheat.

### Armed Men Guard Stores of Butte.

Butte, Mont.—Desiring to save their  
property against attacks from mobs,  
merchants of Butte have placed armed  
guards in their stores.

Petitions have been completed and  
a proposed charter amendment filed  
for the abolishment of the commission  
form of government in Baker and the  
substitution of the city manager plan.  
The proposal will be voted on at the  
general election in November, and, if  
carried, will be followed by another  
election in ten days of five commis-  
sioners to serve at nominal pay, who  
shall employ a city manager from any  
part of the country at an annual sal-  
ary of not to exceed \$2400.

### BRIEF NEWS OF OREGON

Nearly three miles of municipal rail-  
road is in operation at Grants Pass,  
the first road of its kind to be started  
in Oregon.

The Oregon state federation of la-  
bor urges Senator Chamberlain to aid  
in passing the senate bill restricting  
immigration. The illiteracy test has  
the indorsement of the federation.

Sixty members of the Oregon Na-  
tional Guard were vaccinated with ty-  
phoid prophylaxis at the Clackamas  
rifle range.

M. F. Henderson of the University  
of Wisconsin has been engaged as  
pathologist and weather observer for  
Jackson county, at a salary of \$2500  
a year and \$1500 for incidental ex-  
penses.

Senator Chamberlain offered amend-  
ments to the sundry civil bill provid-  
ing \$207,000 for the improvement of  
Tillamook bay and \$5000 for use in  
assisting the state of Oregon in guard-  
ing against forest fires.

The state immigration commission,  
has urged through Senator Lane, bet-  
ter life-saving service on the ocean  
beaches north of the Columbia river.  
Life saving crews are willing to under-  
take patrol work on the beaches.

The Astoria 22d annual regatta will  
be held Thursday, Friday and Satur-  
day. From point of attendance, var-  
ied attractions and amusements and  
the number of participants in the big  
races, it bids fair to outclass by far  
any of its predecessors.

Dr. J. P. Wallace of Albany has de-  
clined nomination for state sen-  
ator in the fourth district, and Dr.  
Wallace, republican candidate  
will therefore have the field to him-  
self.

## OREGON NEWS NOTES OF GENERAL INTEREST

### Events Occurring Throughout the State During the Past Week.

### Find Bossen Not Guilty.

Eugene.—After a trial that lasted  
six days, the jury in the case of An-  
drew Bossen, charged with murdering  
his wife, Edith Bossen, at their home  
on the night of March 20 last, return-  
ed a verdict of not guilty. The Bos-  
sens came to Springfield a little over  
a year ago from Douglas county, Ore-  
gon. Evidence in the case was en-  
tirely circumstantial. Bossen was ac-  
cused of administering the poisons  
during the absence of other members  
of the household.

### Blue Sky Law Investigated.

Salem.—Corporation Commissioner  
Watson has gone to Atlantic City to  
attend a convention of bank superin-  
tendents. He said the purpose of his  
trip is to obtain information regarding  
the blue sky laws in case it is desired  
to amend the Oregon law. Mr. Watson  
said he favored a law providing the  
maximum protection to investors, with  
minimum red tape and as little inter-  
ference with legitimate corporate busi-  
ness as possible.

### Sheriff Captures Fisher.

Baker.—Ed Fisher, alleged assailant  
of ex-Mayor Henry Stewart of Cop-  
perfield, who was shot near his home  
was captured near Wallowa lake, in a  
mountain fastness, by Sheriff Ed  
Rand, who had been constantly on his  
trail since the shooting occurred.  
Doctors attending Stewart, whom  
Fisher is alleged to have shot, say he  
will recover.

### Disputed Land Taxed.

Oregon City.—Property valued at  
\$1,149,880, in dispute between the fed-  
eral government and the Oregon &  
California railway company is to be  
put on the tax rolls of Clackamas  
county and, unless an injunction is  
issued an attempt will be made to col-  
lect the taxes. This statement was  
made by J. E. Jack, county assessor.

### Masked Robbers Hold Up 8 Autos.

Marshfield.—Eight automobiles,  
loaded with dancers, en route to a  
roadhouse dance, were held up, one  
after another, between Marshfield and  
South Inlet by two to six masked rob-  
bers, who stripped the occupants of the  
autos of all money and jewels and  
then escaped.

### INQUIRE INTO PHONE RATES

### Group Plan Based on Economic Qual- ity Throughout Two States.

Portland.—Railroad commissions of  
Oregon and Washington which control  
all public utilities in the two states,  
began a joint conference here to as-  
certain how the basic telephone rates  
in the two states are determined and  
why the relations between various  
classes and qualities of service vary  
in larger and smaller communities.

The commissioners announced their  
investigation would result in the for-  
mulation of a plan of grouping and  
classification of rates and services  
that will be based on economic qual-  
ity throughout the two states. A ten-  
tative plan for arriving at such results  
was submitted by the Pacific Tele-  
phone and Telegraph company.

It was expected that the readjust-  
ment would bring about a uniform  
schedule of rates in Seattle, Portland,  
Tacoma and Spokane, while secondary  
communities would receive a rate  
schedule that agrees for the same  
services rendered.

### New Course is Planned.

St. Johns.—The school directors are  
considering the question of installing  
a commercial course in the St. Johns  
schools, to include typewriting, sten-  
ography, penmanship, orthography and  
kindred subjects. Night sessions may  
be held.

Can of Salmon Found in Halibut.  
Newport.—M. Wachsman, master of  
the halibut fishing launch Sea Dog,  
discovered a large-sized salmon can  
containing some salmon in the stom-  
ach of a halibut.

### Dairy Business Shows Increase.

Union.—The dairy business shows a  
big increase this season over last and  
two companies are paying out about  
\$6000 per month for butter fat.
