

INQUIRE INTO PHONE RATES Group Plan Based on Economic Qual-

ity Throughout Two States.

Portland .- Railroad commissions of Oregon and Washington which control all public utilities in the two states. began a joint conference here to ascertain how the basic telephone rates in the two states are determined and why the relations between various classes and qualities of service vary in larger and smaller communities.

The commissioners announced their investigation would result in the formulation of a plan of grouping and classification of rates and services that will be based on economic equality throughout the two states. A tentative plan for arriving at such results was submitted by the Pacific Tele-

It was expected that the readjustment would bring about a uniform schedule of rates in Seattle, Portland, lacoma and Spokane, while secondary communities would receive a rate schedule that agrees for the same services rendered.
