Perhaps the Sound has some newspapers that are not being forced to a standard to justify partisan prediction that the county has come to the end of the line. Oregon will offer a wide outlet for the lumber of the coast that so long has depressed and frightened legitimate business. Almost anyone can guess the shifting plan of the newspaper theorists.

Have you noticed the fine patch of fern that is growing on the pavement on Stillwell Ave., opposite the school house? The thought has come to us that possibly Ben Baker might secure from the Warren Construction Co., the position of grass and weed cutter on our paved streets, for it certainly looks bad for the company to have weeds growing up all about through the pavement. It seems to us that a job of this kind would fit in very nicely during these dull Democratic times when Mr. Baker has so much to say about. You won't need your glasses to find those ferns, Ben Baker. They are the ferns growing fine and more so.

Correspondence has been given out which shows that the controversy between the United States and Japan over the California alien land law is still acute—or again acute, may be a more correct putting. At no time since the matter came up, over a year ago, has the Japanese government allowed it to be forgotten. With steadily increasing forcefulness it has insisted that the California legislation was not only in violation of treaty obligations, but indicated radical antagonism and was at variance with the principles of friendship, and mortifying to Japan. The United States has pointed out that under our constitution the federal government cannot interfere with state legislation which does not violate treaty obligations; and has maintained that the California land laws do not violate them. However, it offered to submit the matter to the United States courts; but this Japan has declined to do. Latterly Japan has adopted a more forceful attitude; and the problem appears to be still one of serious possibilities. It is hinted that Japan seems disposed to take advantage of our complications with Mexico and press her case. The chief motive attributed to Japan, however, is the desire of her new ministry to strengthen itself at home by taking a more advanced stand on the California alien land law issue. Japan insists that the alien land law in California shall be repealed. The controversy now stands at a deadlock, and there are intimations in diplomatic circles that it is being worked around to a stage for arbitration at The Hague.
