STANDARD RULES READY

Regulations Will be Forwarded to School Officers.

Salem, La. for the standardization of the rural and village schools of the state will be mailed to the county superintendents by State Superintendent of Public Instruction Churchill. The rules were adopted at a recent meeting of county school superintendents held in this city.

Rules will be posted in all school rooms and when all requirements have been met certificates will be provided by the state department. It is believed that the plan will result in Oregon not only having the most sanitary schools of any state, but will make the schools leaders from an educational standpoint.

Mr. Churchill announced his plan of standardization at a meeting of the State Teachers' Association in Salem last December and a committee drafted a set of rules. Oregon was one of the pioneer states in standardizing schools in districts of the second and third classes, much progress along that line having been made in Coos, Polk, Marion, Linn, Lane, Douglas,

DeKalb, Nassau, Emanuel and Yam-

hill counties. The most important rule relates to teachers and Mr. Churchill is determined that it be enforced if possible. The purpose is to save the lives of the children and will make for efficiency by conserving the health of the pupils.

\$2900 For 35 Cars of Prunes.

Freewater.—Thirty-five carloads of prunes have been sold to a Chicago firm and \$2900 has been placed in the bank to bind the contract just made by the Lamb Fruit company. The contract will net the growers from \$22 to \$25 per ton. The prunes are to be paid for as soon as they are loaded on the cars and the company believes the price will bring it the bulk of the valley crop.

Early Apples Are Shipped.

Hood River.—The strawberry and cherry season has passed and the apple-shipping season has opened. Carload lots of small fruits have been discontinued, although the Apple-growers' association is still receiving small express lots of both cherries and berries.

MRS. WILSON MOURNED

Single Boys and Held over Remains of

President's Wife.

Washington.—Without any formal funeral service, the body of Mrs. Woodrow Wilson, who died in Washington, was held over in the city morgue of the Metropolitan Hotel for 42 hours. The body was then taken to the Washington National Hotel and Washington and the other hotels with the president in mourning for 42 days.

Immediately after the body was held in the morgue, the funeral arrangements were made. The burial place of Mrs. Wilson's remains.

Washington.—The funeral service for Mrs. Wilson will be held at the Metropolitan Hotel at 10 o'clock on Monday. The funeral board is composed of the following members: Charles S. Cash for Stranded Americans.
Washington.—The state department cabled Ambassador Herrick in Paris \$10,000 for the relief of Americans stranded in Europe. About \$100,000 of the fund, it was said, will be needed in Paris alone.

Washington Minors' Marriage Legal.

Olympia, Wash.—The state supreme court held that if a boy and girl under legal age marry without their parents' consent, the marriage is legal, regardless of the fact that the license upon which they married was illegally issued.

LATEST NEWS FROM THE SCENE OF WAR--IMPORTANT BATTLE ON

Nish, August 18.—The Austrians have been completely routed near Schar, 27 miles west of Belgrad, and 15,000 annihilated, according to government sources. The Austrians fled in great disorder, pursued by Serbians, who cut up three regiments and captured 14 guns.

Good reason to believe that a serious engagement, in which Germany advanced by troops of Belgium and France have been going on since Monday, about the Brussels. No definite news of progress of encounter received. German activities in other parts of Belgium reported. Trenches being thrown up in environs of Brussels.

Russian armies said to have begun general advance on Germany last Sunday.

German troops Leipzig, which came into San Francisco yesterday for coal left Golden Gate early today. The Japanese cruiser Idzumi believed to be coming up Pacific Coast to observe movements of Leipzig.

Japan's ultimatum to Germany to withdraw from Kiao Chou has been delivered to Berlin foreign office through Copenhagen.

Announcement from London and Paris that no war correspondents be allowed in field, coupled with Great Britain's request to Belgium to expel correspondents make it probable story first great battle will be told only through official reports. German and Austrian military regulations prohibit correspondents with army, and Russia profiting by experience in this connection in Russia, press 1915.

General Joffre, French commander-in-chief, reports fighting all day Monday. French continued progress in upper Alsace, but retreat in disorder elsewhere where they succeeded, and others. Major units French troops occupied all region to west of Penetrance, 25 miles inside German frontier in Lorraine. Our troops poured through Valley of River Sells, of which number of passes have been evacuated by Germans. Our Cavalry at Chateau Salins.

TWO GERMAN CRUISERS DISABLED AND CAPTURED.

Shanghai, August 18.—Two German cruisers were disabled and brought to Hong Kong. Confirmation of the fact received here today. Deck works ratters and barbettes of two cruisers demolished and masts and funnels shot away. Their sides were stained with blood which had run through the shipwreck.

AUSTRIANS LOSE TROOP SHIP.

Rome, August 18.—Austrian troop ship No. 19 struck mine at entrance of harbor at Pola, the Austrian naval base in the Adriatic, and went down. Only one member of the crew was saved.

CIVIL GUARD MOBILIZE AT ANTWERP.

London, August 18.—Germany cavalry patrols been located to north of Antwerp. Military government has ordered entire civil guard of Antwerp to be mobilized on war footing and to take positions in forts about city.

RUSSIAN EMPEROR MAKES HEADQUARTERS AT MOSCOW.

Washington, August 18.—Cablegram from American embassy in St. Petersburg said Russian Emperor left capital August 17 for Moscow to make headquarters with army.

CLASH IN AFRICA BETWEEN ENGLISH AND GERMAN.

London, August 18.—News from British Gold Coast of Africa says British forces of that colony have had brushes with German troops in Togoland. They have taken some German prisoners and captured two trains.

GERMAN EMPEROR CONFIDENT OF SUCCESS.

Berlin, August 18.—The German Emperor, before his departure for the front to-day, issued a decree saying: "I am firmly confident, with the help of God, bravery of the German army and navy and the unquenchable unanimity of the German people during these hours of danger, that victory will crown our cause."

INCURSION INTO BRUSSELS STOP.

Brussels, August 18.—German incursion in directing Brussels seemed definitely stopped according to official communication issued by war office. It adds "Situation remains excellent for our army."

PRESIDENT WILSON GIVES WARNING TO U.S. CITIZENS.

Washington, D. C. August 18.—Addressing American people, President Wilson issued statement in connection with the European war, warning citizens of the U. S. against "That deepest, most subtle, most essential breach of neutrality which may spring out of partisanship and out of passionately taking sides."

Washington, D. C. August 18.—Attorney General McReynolds will be nominated by the president to fill the vacancy on the supreme court bench within the next few days, according to definite information.
