SALEM CONVICTS VOTE DRY

The convicts in the Penitentiary at Salem are more than four to one in favor of a dry Oregon. Probationer Officer Snodgrass engaged a convict sentenced to life imprisonment, known as a "lifer" to pose the convicts on prepared cards. The men were told that the records would be kept secret; it did not matter how they voted; they were just to be honest over it.

The result was: In favor of the Oregon dry amendment, No. 32 X, Yes, 255; against, 53. Fifty three refused to express their preference. About the same number were at honor camps and could not be reached. The Penitentiary vote is a dramatic plea for the passage of the Oregon dry amendment. Official records show that 87 per cent of the convicts are at Salem as a result of saloons. The vote at the Penitentiary was taken for the Committee of One Hundred, the organization of Oregon business men fighting on behalf of Oregon dry.

BRIEF NEWS OF OREGON

Eugene S. Colthran, of Portland, has been appointed inspector of the geological survey service at a salary of \$1500. The speech of A. L. Mills, president of the First National bank, made at Portland August 14, was ordered printed by the senate as a public document. Negotiations are afoot in Harney county for the location of a Mormon colony on lands now owned by the Oregon & Washington Colonization company. Another epidemic of dog poisoning has broken out in Pendleton and the indignation among dog owners is such that big rewards are being offered for the apprehension of the guilty persons.

MILITIA ORDERED TO BUTTE

Governor Mobilizes State's Force For Service at Butte Mines. Helena, Mont.—Governor Stewart ordered the immediate mobilization of the entire state militia, consisting of ten companies, as a result of the renewal at Butte of factional troubles among the miners.

Butte, Mont.—Butte is under martial law under a proclamation issued by Governor Samuel V. Stewart. A proclamation issued by Major D. J. Donahue, commanding officer, prescribed the rules for the conduct of Butte. All saloons are ordered closed until further notice and public gatherings of any character are forbidden without permission of the commanding officer. Ten companies of the state national guard, Major D. J. Donahue commanding, have arrived here.

IDAHO PRIMARY RESULTS

Returns Point to Senator Brady's Success at Primary Election. Boise, Idaho.—Scattering returns from all parts of the state indicate the probability of United States Senator James B. Brady and Governor John M. Hulse, republicans, and the nomination of James H. Hawley, democrat, for United States senator, and Moses Alexander, democrat, for governor. Representative Addison T. Smith, republican, has been renominated. Present indications are that James H. Hawley will defeat John F. Nugent for the democratic nomination for United States senator, and that Dow Dunning and J. H. Ferney will be nominated for representative on the democratic ticket. The balance of the democratic ticket has no opposition. Judge Edward H. Walters is leading his three other opponents in the republican nomination for justice of the supreme court, and Charles W. Beale will probably be the second nominee. The contest on the remainder of the republican state ticket, especially for lieutenant-governor, secretary of state and state treasurer is close. Sweeley for lieutenant-governor, Barker for secretary of state and Allen for state treasurer appear to be in the lead.

WAR RISK BILL IS PASSED

Fund of \$5,000,000 is Provided to Meet Possible Losses. Washington.—The administration bill to create a federal bureau of marine war risk insurance, with a \$5,000,000 fund to meet possible losses to American shipping, was passed in the house by a vote of 236 to 58. It has already been passed by the senate. The bill establishes for the first time in American history a federal marine insurance, though it is restricted to risks of war and especially applicable to the European emergency. It insures American vessels, their freight and passenger moneys and cargoes whenever it shall appear to the secretary of the treasury that American vessels, shippers or importers in American vessels are unable in any trade to secure adequate war risk insurance on reasonable terms.

Czar Changes Name of Capital

London.—A dispatch to the Reuter Telegram company from St. Petersburg says that by imperial order the city of St. Petersburg, capital of the Russian empire since 1712, will henceforth be known as Petrograd.

army corps were taken, including two commanding generals, 300 officers and the complete artillery of the Russian army.

The statement of the big German victory against the Russians attracted wide attention. Military observers pointed out that if the number of Russians taken prisoner had been estimated at 70,000 there must have been great losses, no mention of which is made. The statement conflicts to some extent with one issued by the French embassy, which speaks of the progress of the Russian offensive army.
