### TILLAMOOK COUNTY BEACHES

**Neah-kah-nie**  
The Neah-kah-nie mountain resort, which is being developed by S. G. Reed is considered one of the most beautiful spots in Oregon. A fine hotel serves the wants of the resorters and a good water system has been installed. Many miles of good roads have been built here and much has been done for the comfort of those who spend their vacations there.

**Other Resorts.**  
Between Brighton and Bar View are a number of resorts of growing importance. They are as follows: Geiser, Manhattan, Lake Lytle, Seaview, Rockaway, Elmore Park, Saltair, Midway Beach, Twin Rocks, Rose City Park and Ocean Lake nearly all of these resorts are equipped with a water system and have hotel accommodations. They all have beautiful beaches and furnish delightful recreation.

**Bayocean**  
Bayocean, which is the most important resort in the county, is in a class by itself. Here several hundreds of thousands of dollars have been spent in beautifying the place and making improvements. A drifter has deepened a good ship channel to this point and large docks have been constructed to handle the traffic which comes by water. One of the best hotels in Oregon is in operation here and all guests receive the best of care and treatment. Bayocean has several miles of well paved streets and a good lighting and water system has been installed. One of the latest innovations for this popular resort is the natatorium or swimming pool that was installed this spring. The natatorium building is of mammoth size and is equipped with artificial wave making machinery. The advantage of the natatorium is to give the bathers water that is warm and comfortable to bathe in. Water is pumped from the ocean and run through heated pipes and then pumped into the large tank. The Bayocean natatorium is first of its kind to be installed on the Pacific Coast. Work on a new automobile road from Tillamook City to Bayocean was begun this summer and will be pushed as rapidly as possible until it is completed.

**Resorts in the South**  
The leading resorts south from Bayocean are Netarts, Pacific City and Neskewin. Netarts has a beautiful beach and much beautiful scenery adjacent thereto. Good hotels are also located here. A daily stage carries passengers to and from Tillamook over a most scenic road.  
Pacific City, which is destined to be one of the most popular resorts in the county is located on the beautiful Nestucca River and near a fine stretch of ocean beach. A splendid grove at this point affords campers an ideal camping ground, splendid fishing of all kinds including salmon, trout, deep sea and shell fish. Pacific City is noted for its boating, fishing and splendid beaches. A good hotel is located here, and there is a good general store conducted by Dwight Edmunds, and other lines of business necessary to a resort of this kind.  
Neskewin, is the southernmost resort in Tillamook County, being located near the southern boundary line of the county. It is reached by one of the most scenic roads in the county, and affords fine camping privileges and other attractions. A general store, postoffice and cheese factory are located here.

### TILLAMOOK COW TESTING ASSOCIATION MEETS

**Tillamook Cow Testing Association.**  
On Thursday the 10th of September the Tillamook Cow Testing Association held its first farm picnic on the farm of its president, Mr. Charles Kunze. About sixty people, composed of members and their friends, gathered during the forenoon and while the men went on a tour of inspection of the farm the ladies sewed and talked in ladyly fashion. When they had each other for as much as twenty-four hours.  
Among the interesting and instructive things which were found on the farm was a half acre of alfalfa, seeded last spring in co-operation with the county Agriculturalist. In spite of the drought and a heavy nurse crop of oats which were sown with it the alfalfa has made a very good showing. When the oats were cut the alfalfa was twelve to fifteen inches high. The alfalfa now looks nice and green with roots down in the ground showing quite a nodular growth. The seed was inoculated and part of the land was limed before seeding.  
Another interesting thing was a land leveler which Mr. Kunze has been using on a piece of land which was cleared of stumps two years ago and twice cropped to oats. This leveler is made of two inch plank twelve inches wide and is 66 feet long by 8 feet wide. It has planks across both ends and one through the middle. This made two long a machine to turn so he attached a chain to each end and after dragging it down the field he hitched the team to the other end and dragged it back in the same track until nearing the end when he swung over for the next land. This field was very rough and rolling as no attempt had been made at leveling it since blowing the stumps except to the two plowmen. After double dragging it both ways he has as smooth a field as one can ask for. Mr. Kunze is very much pleased with the work the leveler does but says it is a horse killer. He used four horses, a heavy team and a light team, on it and then

had to rest them frequently. It needs two big teams or three medium ones to handle it in good shape.

On returning to the house we found in the yard a table, built of straw bales, and spread with lunch such as only farm women can prepare. There were sandwiches, salads, cold meats, fried chicken, and pies and cake for further orders, not to forget plenty of the famous Tillamook cheese. After everyone had completely lost his appetite there was still enough to feed a small sized army.

After lunch, Mr. Kunze, acting as toastmaster, gave us a little history of the Association, the difficulties of its organization three years ago, the final success of the undertaking, and of what it has done, is doing, and is going to keep doing for the dairymen of this vicinity. He then called out County Agriculturalist, R. C. Jones, who gave a short talk on feeding and the best combination of feeds for good results under Tillamook conditions. Several sample balanced rations were shown and many questions were asked concerning feeds and methods. This was followed by an able talk on the relation of the Commercial Club to the Farmer, by Hon. C. R. Worrall, Sec. of the Tillamook Commercial Club.

Much interest was shown in Mr. Kunze's herd of grade Holsteins and all who could, stayed to see his B. L. K. milker work in the evening. He has been operating this machine all summer on his herd of thirty cows and reports complete satisfaction. He experienced only a slight drop in the change from hand to machine milking and this was entirely gained back in two days time. Mr. Kunze is a keen observer and pays close attention to the cows and machine at milking time.

The gathering finally broke up, all reporting an instructive day and looking forward to the next quarterly meeting on the same farm.

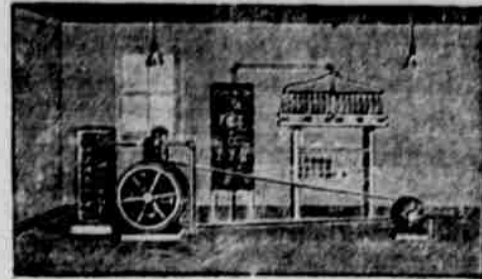
