In the midst of the pure and unadorned revelry when the beauty and elvish of Tillamook had gathered to do honor to old Dame Time, when music rose with its enchanting swell, when youthful hearts beat happily, when soft eyes looked love to eyes that spoke again, when all went merry as a marriage bell; but hush! hark! the chiming of the church bells proclaimed the hour when "A Happy New Year" rang of from every lip, and "Good Night", the best time of my life, drew down the curtain and turned the lights.

## OBITUARY

John C. Sanders was born in Germany, June 10, 1853, died in Tillamook, Oregon, December 27, 1914, age 61 years, 6 months, 17 days. He came to America with his parents at the age of four and located in Missouri. A short time after arriving in Missouri his parents died, leaving a family of boys and girls without parents.

After living in Missouri for nine years he came to Tillamook county where he has lived since, except for the last two years during which time he spent most of his time in Sheridan. He leaves three brothers and three sisters: Mrs. A. Schmidt and Anton Sanders of Moberly, Mo.; Clara Sanders of Sweet Water, Idaho; and Mrs. L. Peltz and Herman Sanders of Tillamook. He died at the home of his sister Mrs. Peltz. At the funeral which was held at the Catholic church, Rev. Father Van-Clarenbeck spoke of the deceased as being an exemplary young man who had died believing steadfastly in his faith. He was highly thought of by all who knew him.

## Presbyterian Church Notes.

Rev. J. V. Milligan, D. D., and Rev. C. W. Hayes, D. D., Synodical and Presbyterian Sunday School missionaries, spent Wednesday evening with the local church in Tillamook, and held a Sunday School conference with the officers and teachers in the Guild House. The Presbyterian church which has always been a leader in the work of religious education, has taken an advance step in its educational plan for the current year. The four general features of the plan are: (1) Membership increase, (2) Class organization, (3) Training Leaders, and (4) Educational Evangelism. The details of the plan were fully explained by Drs. Milligan and Hayes. The conference was well attended, and an unusual interest aroused in Sunday School work. The Christmas tree and program on Christmas eve, surpassed the expectations of the most sanguine and enthusiastic Presbyterians in the city. The church was packed to its utmost capacity, and over 25 persons were turned away for want of standing room. The program in the auditorium of the church was considered by the oldest member of the church to be the finest and most unique ever given in Tillamook. The children were all at their best, and the songs and recitations were of a remarkable high order. The chief aim of the Presbyterian Sunday school is to develop the religious life of the child. Fun and sociability has its own proper place, but even that is chaste and uplifting. At the conclusion of the musical and literary program, the school and visitors repaired to the Guild House where Santa Claus presided and bestowed his gifts and his blessing upon the little ones. Mr. Jones made an ideal Santa, and his appearance through a real chimney gave a vividness to his gracious presence. The people of Tillamook are cordially invited to the services of the church next Lord's Day, at 10 a. m., 11 a. m., and 7:30 p. m. Our church school is thoroughly graded, using graded lessons, and we have the best teachers in the city. D. A. MacKenzie minister.

## Lands Cheaply Logged Off

Feeny-Bremer Co., Put Economical Land Clearing Machine on Market

The Feeny-Bremer Co., has just completed a very economical device for clearing land in the shape of a gasolene donkey engine, equipped with a 19 h. p. heavy duty engine. The total weight of the machinery is 2,500 lbs., mounted on runners and can be pulled anywhere on a straight line by its own power. The donkey part consists of a double drum, double friction, equipped with breaks. It has 400 feet of 1/2 in. cable and 800 feet of 3/4 inch cable. As a demonstration it recently pulled with ease a 20 foot log 3 feet in diameter over rough ground. Anyone wishing a demonstration of the workings of the machine can witness the same by calling at the Feeny-Bremer Co. Works. The price for the above equipment ranges from \$700 for 10 h. p. up, larger sizes costing accordingly. The engine consumes distillate, consuming 6 gallons in 10 hours, cost 10c a gallon. The engine used is detachable and can be used for other things. Feeny-Bremer Co. are offering a fine proposition for two or more farmers who wish to go in together on a device that will clear their land cheaply and easily. Two men can run the machinery used and handle it successfully. Those who may have use for such a machine will do well to investigate.

## TWO SALOONS CLOSED

Ed Laughlin's saloon has been closed by creditors and we understand that the Bert Stephens saloon will not resume business this year. This leaves Tillamook with five saloons.
