gates from all parts of the Northwest will be present.

The Southern Pacific has announced the rates which will apply to tourist travel between Portland and San Francisco during the period of the great exposition, tickets to be on sale daily between February 15 and November 30. On 90-day limit tickets the rate will be \$35; on 30-day tickets \$30; on special occasions, such as important conventions, etc., a round trip rate will be made of \$25.75 with a 15-day limit and stop-over privileges on the return trip. To the exposition at San Diego, the road will make a round trip rate of \$52.25 with a limit of 40 days and stop-over privileges both ways.

RURAL CREDITS ARE FAVORED

The committee appointed by Governor West to consider the report made to the government by the commission that went from the United States in 1913 to Europe to study rural credits and farm loan system and make recommendations to the legislature met in Salem yesterday and decided on their recommendations. The members of the committee are: Dr. Hector MacPherson, of O.; A. C.; Dr. F. G. Young, of U. of O.; Dana H. Allen and Samuel M. Garland, members of the legislature, and S. G. Sargeant, state bank superintendent.

They will recommend that the legislature enact a law establishing a rural credit system in this state, establishing community banks through which it will be possible for farmers to get short time loans at a low rate of interest. They will recommend that the legislature memorialize congress to give early consideration to a federal farm mortgage credit act, which will make provisions for farmers to secure long time loans at a low rate of interest and the principal to be repaid in yearly installments.

Another recommendation is that a commission, to serve without pay be appointed by the legislature to keep in touch with the progress of national legislation along this line.

Editors note: It is to be hoped that Oregon's legislature will, at its opening session, pass a rural credit and farm loan law, which will act as a relief to our farmers. A law of this kind is demanded by the farmers and their wishes should receive proper consideration.

LABOR DIGNIFIED BY SCIENCE

Oregon Agricultural College, Corvallis, Ore., Jan. 12—"A nation's standing and success are measured by the extent to which its people apply science to their business and industry."

said Mrs. Clara H. Waldo, a member of the O. A. C. Board of Regents, in addressing the students. "It is this application of science to labor that has wiped out the last vestige of the disgrace of labor. The undemocratic ideal of education so long persisted in by this nation has finally given place to the principles of education for service. We learned our lesson slowly, but we have learned it well—the book side of education is but one-half of education."

"As a nation we yet have much to learn in domestic science and art. In France cooks are assigned places in the professions along with lawyers and doctors, and my late landlady of Paris has written me with real pride that she is going to become the bride of her chef. The Japanese also look upon house-work as one of the most honorable professions, since the position implies trust in the integrity of the worker. Many highly educated Japanese prefer doing home work to commercial work, because it permits a more general application of scientific principles and it permits no waste of time."

Potato growers of Oregon are asking that a strict quarantine be established against all potatoes shipped from California owing to danger of the tuber moth gaining a foothold in this state. So far as known, Oregon potatoes are now entirely free from this pest and the state board of horticulture has been asked to take such action as will assure future safety.
