HIGH SCHOOL NOTES

The school library has had several additions lately. Mr. H. T. Botts has donated a splendid set of the "History of Central Oregon." He has also given the library a number of volumes of valuable government reports.
Through the kindness of Senator Harry Lane the library has recently received nearly one hundred and fifty volumes of government publications. Some of these are of great value in the debate, and agricultural work, and all will undoubtedly prove very useful. All these are being catalogued and put in the library in the same way as purchased volumes. This work is being done entirely by the students.
A new library table, built by the Manual Training department is now in the library room. The magazines received regularly by the library are kept upon this for the use of the students.

The library will be glad to receive files of magazines. Many back numbers of current magazines contain articles of great use to debating teams or in class work. The library especially desires to secure files of the "Independent," the "Outlook," the "Review of Reviews," "World's Work" and magazines of that type. If these can be secured complete, they will be bound and put in permanent form for the use of the students. It will be greatly appreciated if those who are discarding old magazines will give the school an opportunity to go through them and select any that may be of value in the library.

FAIRVIEW GRANGE IN-STALLS NEW OFFICERS

It was brought out that we had not an inspector in here for some time, and that some of the dairymen would like to see one. It was also brought out that we might be getting short weights in some of our places of business, along with some adulterated food stuffs.

Agriculturist Jones gave a short address on Farmers and Dairymen's week at the O. A. C.; pointing out some of the good things one would receive there, and urging everyone to take advantage of the opportunity.

County School Superintendent Bue gave a brief review of some of the school laws, that he thought should be changed and passed.

County Commissioner McKimena gave a short synopsis of some of the things the County Court was trying to do.

Dear Sir:—There are several taxpayers of Tillamook County that would like to have some information about the rights of the County Court to allow our County School Superintendent several hundred dollars for expenses, when our school law says in reference to his salary, "Tillamook County \$1,000. No sum shall be allowed the said superintendent for expenses or any other purposes, but the salary hereby fixed shall be in full for salary as well expenses of every kind. [L. O. L. Sec. 1893]" Oregon School Laws, 1913, Page 34.

We have seen from time to time where the County Court has allowed him extra sums for expenses. We do not understand it, is it legal? Has the County Court greater power than the legislature, or is there another law that gives them this right? If so, why have this law in the school law books? A notice the levy for 1915 allows a lot extra for his office, \$2,400. Has the Legislature passed an act to that effect, or the County Court, or the people of the County? Maybe our new prosecuting attorney can explain the situation for us or someone. We would be glad to know why this is done in opposition to such plain laws.
