COMMUNICATION.

Editor Herald:

In response to a request communicated from miners and appearing in your paper dated Jan. 18th shall refer the writer of the communication and all others who may be misled by the results of the Oregon School Laws, what the law is on this one question. The misleading feature is in the accepting of the School Tax. Many groups have been quoted what has been received by later acts.

On page 16 See Mr. School laws 1912-13 it is found this in substance. That County School Superintendents of the State will be allowed to collect taxes. This was enacted at the Legislature Session for 1912, and will be found in page 261, Sec. 22, of the session laws, 1912.

The special act referred to by the Headlight writer was passed at the 1912 session.

The session laws for 1912 clearly stipulate the salaries for the officers of the County. This will be found on page 233 of said Session Laws. The enacting of the special clause makes it evident that it had been reported by the general committee referred to above and also the new salary bill for Tillamook County would further repeat same.

However, before there were any traveling expenses granted the County Superintendent, or at least the present one, there was an amount handed down to the Court from the Attorney General.

The law provides for additional expense for the assistance of the County School Superintendent above what is now being expended to the amount of about \$5000. per annum. This will be found on pages 48, 49, Sec. 90 and 91 inclusive, School Laws 1912.

The plan for the year and the expenditures were placed before the Advisory Committee at the time the budget was made up and was selected by them because of less expenditure compared with other plans presented at
