AMERICA RIGHT IS BRITISH REPLY

Detention Will Not Stop, But Redress Promised if Fleet Exceeds Law.

Washington—Great Britain's preliminary reply to the note from the United States government, regarding improvement in the treatment of American commerce by the British fleet, was made public here and in London by mutual agreement between the state department and the British foreign office.

Briefly, the British note, while concurring in the principles of the American government's contentions, points out difficulties in actual practice, refers to alleged fraudulent practices by ship-owners and other statistics showing an increase rather than decrease, in certain neutral commerce, in support of Great Britain's contention that Germany and Austria have been indirectly obtaining contraband through neutral countries. The note promises, however, that Great Britain "will make redress whenever the action of the British fleet may unreasonably exceed the limits of international law."

The general complaint of the United States is that Great Britain, while nominating redress and while conceding the principle of international law does not accept the principle of its fleet with the allowances of its foreign office.

House Refuses to Submit Suffrage. The House of representatives, by a vote of 204 to 174, refused to submit to the states an amendment to the federal constitution to enfranchise women.

80 Admit Election Frauds. Indianapolis—That a conspiracy to corrupt the Terre Haute election of November 2, 1914, had existed was admitted by 80 men, who before Judge Anderson in United States district court pleaded guilty to an indictment returned by the federal grand jury the day before Christmas.

Governor Lister Suggests Convention. Olympia—Governor Lister's message called attention to the enormous increase in the cost of government and voiced the opinion that to make the only reforms that could bring about a reduction in public expenditures and simplification of government machinery would necessitate the holding of a constitutional convention, which the legislature was advised to call.

NEW CHEESE FACTORY IN OPERATION.

From Coover. Today witnessed the commencement of cheese making in a new factory at Claverdale which is the largest and best completely arranged factory in Tillamook county.

The main building is 120x30 feet, the curing room is 41x30 and the making room 44x30. These two rooms have a solid, connected concrete floor and the sidewalk for two feet in the clear is of concrete, forming a high concrete basin, aside from the door openings, 4x20 ft. at the foundation wall is of solid concrete. The floor of the making room is made with gutters to convey the whey from this room to the pipes leading to the whey tank and also to convey refuse water from the building during the cleaning process.

The old factory which has done service and accommodated the dairymen here for the past 13 years was this week dismantled and today has the appearance of an institution that had filled its mission and filled it admirably. Harry Thomas has charge of the new factory of the Claverdale Cheese Co., and today for the first time made cheese in the new building.

Three independent bodies are now probing into the affairs of state officers.
