The following item was published in the last issue of the Herald, under the caption of the Gossip.

"The Herald man had the audacity to call the Gossip 'smutty' (etc). The good old book says that evil is he that evil thinketh. It is Trombley's evil mind that is at fault. The Gossip editor is informed that the Herald man listened to a real smutty parody the other night, but he does not appear to raise any objections or to have criticized those who were responsible for the introduction of dirty smutty poetry. Shame on the Herald man to listen to such smutty smut as that and on women too."

In the above article the Herald man is attacked because he was put to the embarrassment of listening to a smutty parody not long ago in this city. We felt at the time that the matter should have received a public airing, and now that the opportunity has very forcibly presented itself we are going to say what we know about the matter and also how we feel about it.

To begin with we will state that at a meeting of the commercial club which was held one week ago last Monday evening a certain Dr. Hanna gave a series of slight of hand tricks, at the conclusion of which he gave a dirty, rotten, vile parody. We felt at the time, and we afterwards learned that others felt the same way, that we should have gotten up and left the hall. We also felt that the management of the club should have received a downright scolding. However, we refrained from giving the matter publicity, because of our interest in the club, because of the many respectable men who were present that night, and because of even the fair name of the city.

Now then who was responsible for Dr. Hanna's program? The first thing to consider is the entertainment committee. If we are not mistaken Calvin R. Worrall is at the head of the entertainment committee, at least he manages and arranges for the entertainments, as everyone knows. It is true that the editor of the Herald is on the entertainment committee. But we wish to make this statement, that during the past year, during the time we have been on this committee, we have never been notified of a committee meeting. The matter of entertainment so far as we can see has been entirely in the hands of C. R. Worrall, and what is more we can produce evidence to prove that Calvin R. Worrall knew the nature of this man Hanna, that he had heard him give the same program before and that he invited Dr. Hanna to the Commercial Club the Monday evening in question, expecting him to give the dirty, rotten parody that he did give.

So long as C. R. Worrall is secretary of the Tillamook Commercial Club the Editor of the Herald will have nothing to do with it.

This has been forced upon us. You know that when a thing gets about so rotten it will burst of itself.

While we cannot positively prove who the editor of the "Gossip" is, we have a pretty good idea as to who he is, and so have others.

LIME DEPOSITS

UNDER DEVELOPMENT

The plant for the development of the lime deposits south of Tillamook City will be in operation in about two weeks and ready to fill orders for lime.

The buildings are being designed and built and the machinery installed by Mr. U. G. Jackson a thoroughly capable engineer whose practical knowledge of the problem involved assures success to the enterprise.

Our people have not yet fully realized what this development really means to this country. To have an ample supply of good lime for agricultural purposes, immediately available at prices that all can afford, means that our prairie lands will again be growing clover and similar crops as abundantly as they did 30 years ago. Lime in the soil will make possible far better crops on bottom lands.

Several thousand dollars are being spent in the enterprise and we wish the promoters success.

We have received numerous letters from people outside of Tillamook County as to this lime already, and it is probable that a shipping market will be obtained.

RUSH FOR CHEAP LANDS

AND HOMESTEADS ON MIAMI

A. G. Bear is the first of five families who have homesteaded and bought land on Moss creek near the Miami to haul his furnishings and family and settle on Moss Creek. He has a cabin until a new house can be built. Mr. Fred Puleipher and wife have a nice new house almost finished on Moss Creek and the other five families will be on the land before March. Mr. Benson of Garibaldi had the contract for hauling the furniture and provisions for Mr. Bear and it was a tough job as a road had to be cut through. If there was only one county road on the south side of the Miami it would open up all the lands to settlement and place them on the assessment roll. No roads have held this section from settlement.

It is understood that the many families now living on Moss Creek will endeavor to get a county road put through.

MOSS FOR SAN FRANCISCO FAIR

Gathering trees from the shady brooks and rivulets of Tillamook county is a new industry in this section, and is destined to advertise Tillamook in the Panama Exposition at San Francisco. Mr. S. H. White and assistants are now gathering the beautiful Spagnum Moss which grows on the water maple and kindred trees along the Miami. Mr. White is now camped on Moss creek on the old Rock Homestead and has shipped over two hundred crates to the expert gardeners and florists who are getting the beautiful orchids and plants ready for the public at the big fair. All the orchids at the fair will be grown in Tillamook moss. Mr. White says the largest orchid plant in California grows by the Western Orchid Co. with 250 blooms will advertise Tillamook moss around which it grows.

S. H. White has shipped recently per steamer Yucatan from Astoria 250 crates of Tillamook spagnum moss consigned to the following San Francisco florists: J. A. Carls, W. H. Moses, A. H. Morris, of Los Angeles, Hill Bros., McClure and McClaren and J. C. Seigfried.
